## CENTRAL TO ENTER CITY OF DES MOINES

**SUCH IS ANNOUNCEMENT MADE BY DES MOINES COMMERCIAL CLUB.**

**LEASE ROCK ISLAND LINE FROM OSKALOOSA TO CAPITAL.**

Minneapolis & St. Louis and Central Close Lease For Line Jointly, and Will Run Trains Thru From North—Contract Becomes Effective Jan. 1, 1912.

According to a statement issued by Secretary Geis Botsford, of the Des Moines Commercial Club, the Minneapolis & St. Louis and Iowa Central railways have closed a lease whereby they will be enabled to enter Des Moines.

The statement is to the effect that the M. & St. L. and Iowa Central have leased that portion of the Rock Island line from Oskaaloosa to Des Moines, and will run trains from the Twin Cities to Des Moines, via Oskaaloosa.

The contract is to become effective Jan. 1, 1912, according to Mr. Botsford's statement. As far as known here the Central has made no official statement of the new arrangement.

### AMATEUR WINS RACE.

**Bergdoll Lowers Record in Philadelphia Road Race.**

Philadelphia, Oct. 10.—Averaging more than sixty-one miles an hour for the entire distance, Erwin Bergdoll, a young Philadelphia amateur automobile driver, of a wealthy family, won the fourth annual 20 1/4 miles road race over the Fairmount Park course with a ninety horse power Benz. Bergdoll lowered the record for a lap and also reduced by about eleven minutes, the Fairmount Park record for the race. His time was three hours, 18 minutes and 41.25 seconds. He reduced the lap record from seven minutes 38 seconds to seven minutes, 28 seconds for the 8 1/2-10 miles.

Wiscart, another amateur, finished second in a ninety horse Mercedes in 3:20:11.42; Ralph Mulford, driving a Lozier, was third in 3:21:53.78; Len Zengie, who won the race last year,

was fourth in a National in 3:25:59.36; Louis Disbrow, also driving a National, finished fifth in 3:28:23.32. Harry Grant, a two-time Vanderbilt cup winner, driving a Lozier, was sixth in 3:28:59.37; Hughie Hughes in a Mercedes, seventh, time 3:29:45.30; Gil Anderson eighth, in a Stutz, time 3:30:46.10, and Derald Garr ninth, time 3:40:33.37.

Bergdoll received \$2,500 and an additional \$1,000 for being the fastest car in division six of the classification under the rules of the American Automobile Association.

Washart received \$1,000 for the fastest time in 5C; Disbrow \$1,000 for the fastest time in 4C.

Other drivers who started, but dropped out were Fred Betz, in a Piatt; Charles Raale in a Cole; Joseph Jagersberger in a Case; August Parker in a Cole; Willie Wallace in a Mercedes; Ralph Depalm in a Meyers. Only one met with an accident and that befell

Jagersberger's car, which hit a telephone pole, damaging it so that he was compelled to abandon the race.

The race was the most successful yet held by the Quaker Motor Club, not a contestant nor a spectator being injured while the race was on.
