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STRIKE IN BOSTON OPENS WITH RIOT

EMPLOYEES OF ELEVATED RAILROAD SUDDENLY CEASE WORK AND ATTACK CARS.

WINDOWS BROKEN, CREWS AT WORK ASSAULTED

Several Arrests Made—Many Suburban Towns Affected by Strike and Car Service is Curtailed—Dispute Over Recognition of Union Cause of Trouble.

Boston, June 7.—Violence marked the beginning of a strike of several thousand employees of the Boston elevated railway at daylight. Those who refused to work demanded recognition by the company of a recently-formed union. The company refused to deal with them, other than individually.

Strike Comes Suddenly. The street railway service on the elevated roads was being operated on about half time. Five arrests have been made for assaults on motormen.

Almost Complete Returns From South Dakota Primary Indicate That Gamble Has Been Defeated in Senatorial Contest.

Redfield, S. D., June 7.—Complete returns received at Sterling headquarters from fifty-nine out of sixty-one counties give Thomas Sterling a plurality of 1,152 over Senator Gamble for the republican nomination for senator. REGULAR SOLDIERS TO AID MARINES

UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT. ORDERS THAT 6000 MEN BE SENT TO CUBA.

TRANSPORTS TO BE PLACED IN COMMISSION AT ONCE

Additional Marines Landed to Garrison Threatened Posts Where American Interests Are Involved—Negro Sergeants Attack Sugar Plantation in Suburbs of Havana.

Washington, June 7.—The general staff of the army today issued preparatory orders for the dispatch of a military expedition of 5,000 troops to Cuba.

The four big army transports now at Newport News were ordered to be put in commission, provisioned and supplied. Orders also were sent to the army post from which the troops will be drawn to have them in readiness for the movement.

The troops will be taken from Plattsburg barracks, Forts Porter, Niagara and Governor's Island, N. Y., and Fort McPherson and Oglethorpe, Georgia. At the war department it was emphatically stated that if the expeditionary force did go to Cuba it would not be with any thought of political interference in the affairs of the island government. The principal object would be to aid Cuba in restoring order.

More Marines Landed. Santiago, Cuba, June 7.—The United States gunboat Paducah last night landed fifty marines under Lieut. Philip Torrey at the El Cuero mines and sixty marines under Captain Gullo at Punta do Sal. These garrisons will be increased as soon as possible, as they are considered to be insufficient at present for the protection of the property there.

Negroes Attack Sugar Mill. Havana, Cuba, June 7.—A body of negroes armed with rifles attacked the Toledo sugar mill at Marianas, a suburb of Havana, today, evidently with the intention of burning it. They were held at bay by private armed guards, but the firing continued until a troop of cavalry summoned by telephone from Camp Columbia appeared, when the insurgents fled.

Organized Band Supposed to Be Operating in Dubuque. Dubuque, June 7.—It is presumed that an organized band of horse thieves has been operating here. Four valuable animals are missing over night. A camp of gypsies on the outskirts of the city was raided but the leaders denied any knowledge of the matter. They are believed thieves, notwithstanding the denial and a reward, by several with horses is not improbable.

Failed to Locate Home. Danish Church Convention Unable to Select Site for Home for Aged. Special to Times-Republican.

Funeral of Late Congressman Held at Church in Sioux City Today—Interment Made in Floyd Cemetery—Large Delegation of Senators and Representatives in Attendance.

Sioux City, June 7.—The funeral services of the late Congressman Elbert H. Hubbard will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Presbyterian church. Rev. Wallace M. Hamilton, the pastor, will conduct the services. Interment will be in the Floyd cemetery.

A delegation of United States senators and representatives will attend the funeral. The senators are A. B. Cummins and W. S. Kenyon, of Iowa; A. J. Gronna, of North Dakota; and Coe I. Crawford, of South Dakota. The congressmen are J. T. Lloyd, of Missouri; C. O. Lobeck, Nebraska; S. B. Ayers, of New York; I. L. Lenroot, of Wisconsin; and C. R. Davis, of Minnesota, and the Iowa congressmen.

ASSASSIN POOR MARKSMEN. Austrian Count Fired Upon Three Times But Escapes Injury.

Budapest, Hungary, June 7.—Count Tians, president of the lower house, had a narrow escape from assassination in the diet this morning. He was fired upon three times by Deputy Julius Kavacs, who then shot himself, probably with fatal results.

TWELVE MEN KILLED. Soldiers and Workmen in Austria Victims of Explosion in Ammunition Factory—Many Injured and Much Property Damaged.

Vienna, Austria, June 7.—Twelve persons were killed and many others injured in the Woelersdorf ammunition factory in Wiener-Neustadt today, when an explosion occurred in a shed containing scum, the Austrian equivalent for melinite.

The victims were soldiers and workmen. The shock broke windows throughout the town and did much damage in the neighboring watering place of Baden.

Wieners-Neustadt is a manufacturing town thirteen miles south of Vienna.

RELIEF CAMPAIGN ENDS. No More Contributions For Chinese After June 10. Special to Times-Republican.

Des Moines, June 7.—Governor Carroll received word from the secretary of the American Red Cross to the effect that famine relief for the suffering Chinese will end June 10, and after that time no contributions are desired from the Americans. A small fund was raised here and forwarded direct to headquarters.
