



## MARCH 1 RECORDING RECORD IS BROKEN

RUSH TO FILE DOCUMENTS SATURDAY WAS LARGEST IN HISTORY OF OFFICE.

RECORDER SWAMPED WITH DOCUMENTS

Eighty-Five Documents Filed for Record Saturday—Exceeds All Previous Records by Twenty—Forty Documents Filed Up to Noon Today—Business Larger Than a Year Ago.

All records for the number of documents filed to be recorded in the county recorder's office on any other March 1 were broken Saturday, when eighty-five documents, principally deeds and mortgages, were filed. It is said that no other one day in the history of the office came closer than to within twenty of this number.

Up to noon today the indications were that today would be another unusually large day, as forty deeds, mortgages, and other documents had been left to be recorded up to that time.

The previous largest March 1 record was several years ago, when sixty-five deeds, mortgages, and other documents were filed to be recorded. Saturday's business was almost twice as large in the number of papers filed as was the same day of last year.

The rush will continue for several days, or until all the real estate transactions that have been negotiated during the week to be closed March 1 have been consummated and the papers signed. As a result of the unusual bulk of the business, Miss Etta Northrup, and her deputy, Miss Nora Wilcox, have all and more than they can attend to.

J. H. THURSTON DEAD.

Old Resident of Marion and LeGrand Township Dies Sunday.

Death at 7:30 Sunday night claimed Jason H. Thurston, an old resident and farmer of Marion and LeGrand townships, who passed away at his home eight and one-half miles east of the city. Death was due to disease of the stomach and liver, and followed an illness dating from July 2, 1912.

Mr. Thurston was 68 years old, and had lived in the neighborhood where he died since 1855. Beside his wife he is survived by nine children. They are Mrs. R. Snyder, of LeGrand; Arthur Thurston, three miles east of town; Mrs. R. R. Rank, four miles east of this city; Mrs. Bert Winterowd, of Montour; Mrs. Walter Ellis, of Chicago; Mrs. Zoe Mobley, Nellie, John and George, who are at home. Two brothers, Sanford and Grant Thurston, also live in the same neighborhood.

The funeral will be held Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock from the Friends church at LeGrand. Burial will be in the Pleasant Hill cemetery.

## Ellison in Albion Before He Met Death

That Joseph Ellison, the Fredericksburg member of the soldiers' home who was found frozen to death one mile south of Albion Thursday, was in Albion, alive and well, during the evening of the night he met death, was learned from residents of Albion who were in the city Saturday.

Altho not apparently mentally deranged on Wednesday afternoon, when he attended a funeral at the assembly hall and talked with other members of the home, Ellison must have wandered away late in the afternoon, for he was in Albion by supper time, and ate supper at the Kinsey boarding house.

Ellison had informed Mrs. Kinsey that he intended to remain over night, but after supper a traveling man came in for the night, and Ellison informed Mrs. Kinsey that he supposed there would not be room for him, and that he would go down to where he had left his horses, a block away.

Mrs. Kinsey then noticed for the first time that the old man was apparently not right mentally. She asked Ellison if he had driven to Albion, and he replied no; that he had walked. He also said that he intended riding one of his horses home and leading the other.

Other Albion people who knew Ellison saw him on the street as late as 7 o'clock. He hardly got more than a mile from town, in his evident desire to get back to the home, when he succumbed to the cold and exposure of spending the night out of doors.

Ellison's body was taken to Fredericksburg by relatives Saturday night.
