

TRINE MADE CASHIER MARSHALLTOWN BANK

DIRECTORS, IN SPECIAL MEETING, ELECT ASSISTANT TO SUCCEED P. S. BALCH.

BEGAN AS COLLECTOR AND JANITOR IN 1885

But Three Active Men in Charge of Bank's Work When Mr. Trine Entered Institution as Boy—Eleven Now Handle Bank's Business—Trine Native Son and Widely Known.

At a special meeting of the directors of the Marshalltown State Bank, held at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, Charles C. Trine was elected cashier, to succeed the late Phineas S. Balch.

Mr. Trine's selection was unanimous on the part of the board members, and a recognition of his long and faithful work as an employee of the institution, covering a period of over twenty-eight years.

Began as Collector-Janitor.

Mr. Trine's election as cashier is nothing more or less than an illustration of the reward that comes to a young man who is willing to give his employers his best work, and anxious to do something more than draw his pay check.

Mr. Trine entered the Marshalltown State Bank in 1885, as collector and janitor. The janitor work consisted of keeping up hard coal fires during the winter months, sweeping out, and numerous other small duties that do not appeal to the boy of 18 today.

Three in Active Work.

In those days the Marshalltown State Bank was considered a thriving institution, but compared to today it would appear as one of modest pretensions. In 1885 but three employees had charge of the active work of the bank, Albert F. Balch being the cashier, Phineas S. Balch assistant cashier, and young Trine the collector. When Mr. Trine entered the bank the total deposits were only \$78,081.52.

From the position of collector Mr. Trine rose thru the different stages of promotion, working from the ground up, and on Dec. 5, 1892, was elected teller. He served in this capacity until Dec. 13, 1898, when P. S. Balch was elected cashier, and Mr. Trine became assistant cashier.

During the time that the late Mr. Balch was incapacitated from his duties in the bank, owing to illness, and since his death, Mr. Trine has had the cashier's work.

With the promotion of Mr. Trine as cashier, Roy R. Bradbury, who has been second assistant cashier, becomes first assistant.

Trine Native Son.

Mr. Trine is a native of this city, a son of the late Edwin Trine, one of the pioneer harnessmakers of this city. Mr. Trine is widely known thru-out both the city and the county, owing to his long connection with the bank. He is treasurer of the Marshalltown Club, and prominent in the affairs of the Congregational church. He has also served as both city treasurer and treasurer of the independent school district.

Resolutions For Balch.

At their meeting Tuesday afternoon the bank directors also adopted resolutions for the late cashier, referring to his long work with the bank, and the sorrow his death caused among his associates on the directorate. The resolutions were ordered spread on the minutes, and a copy was directed sent to Mrs. P. S. Balch.

MAY ORGANIZE INSTITUTE.

Sunday School Workers Plan to Promote Instruction of Teachers.

A movement is on foot among the Sunday school workers of the city to organize an institute for the recruiting and training of Sunday school teachers. At a meeting of about twenty representatives of most of the churches and Sunday schools and Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. held Tuesday afternoon at the Y. W. C. A. rooms preliminary plans were made.

Prof. Walter Scott Athearn, of Drake University, Des Moines, has been secured to speak on the subject of religious training at the Congregational church next Tuesday night in the interest of the institute plans. The lecture, which will be illustrated, will begin at 8:15. Afterwards a conference will be held when more definite plans for the institute will probably be made.

Services For Well-Known Resident to Be Held From Methodist Church.



It is presumed the boys were picked up by St. Louis officers, whom they told who they were and where they came from. Today the St. Louis officer was notified to turn the boys loose. Olson, who filed the larceny complaint against both boys, was not willing to bear the expense of an officer making the trip to St. Louis to bring the boys back. Olson filed the complaint Jan. 4.
