COUNTY NABBIES TO HAVE EXAMINATIONS

MAY 16 FIXED AS DATE FOR CIVIL SERVICE TESTS IN THIS COUNTY.

FOUR OF FOURTH-CLASS OFFICES NOT AFFECTED

Albion, LeGrand, Clemons, and Lamolle Are the Only Exceptions--Candidates From Latter Two Towns Examined Saturday--Highest Not Necessarily Chosen.

Fourth-class postmasters of Marshall county will take examinations under civil service in this city on Saturday, May 16, according to an order issued in Washington Saturday. Ten of the fourteen offices in the county are affected. The exceptions are Albion, LeGrand, Clemons, and Lamolle.

Outside of Marshalltown all of the offices in the county are fourth-class with the exception of State Center and Gilman, which are third-class offices. Albion has a new postmaster upon examination taken a few months ago, following the resignation of the postmaster. LeGrand aspirants for the office have also been examined, because of a resignation. On Saturday one candidate took an examination to fill the place of Calvin Dickson, resigned, at Clemons, and two candidates were examined to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of George T. Burdick, at Lamolle.

Highest Not Necessarily Chosen. Before President Taft went out of office he placed fourth-class postmasters under civil service. Under President Wilson, however, a new order became effective, that all fourth-class postmasters would have to pass civil service examinations as to their qualifications. It is said that the highest marking in the examination does not necessarily mean that the candidate is chosen, but that one of the three highest may be chosen.

NEW HOUSES PLANNED.

Dr. J. A. Walsler to Build at 709 1/2 West Church Street.

One, and possibly two new houses, and one to be remodeled, are being planned for West Church street and Eighth street.

On a lot bought by C. E. Pearson, 1108 West Main street, from B. A. Morgan, at the corner of Church and Eighth, Mr. Pearson may build a new house on the corner. The lot has a frontage of ninety feet on Church street, and a depth of 180 feet. Mr. Pearson has sold the rear of the west forty-five feet to O. Finney, together with an old house that stands on the property. Mr. Finney will move the house to his lot, and remodel it, probably at a cost of about \$700. He will occupy this as a home.

The west forty-five feet of the property, with a depth of 120, has been sold by Mr. Pearson to Dr. J. A. Walsler, who expects to build a two-story house, to cost about \$3,500. Work is to begin in May.

Work was begun this morning on the excavating for the new home of George W. Almsworth at 607 Jerome street.

DALY LOSES BROTHER.

Comes Here For Visit and Succumbs to Attack of Grip.

Michael A. Daly, of Boston, Mass., brother of County Attorney Anthony C. Daly, died at the latter's home, 508 West State street, at 8:30 Saturday night of grip, complicated with a chronic kidney disorder.

Mr. Daly came here about three weeks ago to visit his brother, who has been ill. Two weeks ago Michael Daly went to Omaha for a short visit, caught a severe cold en route, and returned to his brother's home a week ago Friday, suffering with a severe case of grip. He had been confined to his bed since Monday.

Mr. Daly was a native of Boston, where he was born Sept. 15, 1843. For many years he was connected with the water works department of Boston. In addition to the brother here, Mr. Daly leaves a sister, Miss Margaret Daly, of Boston.

The body left this city Sunday afternoon for Boston, where interment will take place.

HOUSE HAS ANOTHER FIRE.

Department Called Again to Scene of Frequent Blazes.

The house at 503 West Church street got afire again at 7 o'clock Sunday evening. This is the dwelling formerly occupied by Charles Parker, to which the department has been called several times in the last few years, and upon one occasion three times in a single day.

Sunday evening's fire started in the second floor around a stove pipe. It spread thru the floor, but was put out with the chemical apparatus after doing damage estimated at \$50 or more. The new motor truck was sent from the central station to answer the alarm which was the first to which it had responded. Today the old truck was transferred to the south side station, and the team from that station was turned over to the street department.

APPOINTED TO SUCCEED REV. GEORGE E. ALBRIGHT

Rev. Mr. McClelland Has Served at Alburnett and Clermont--Will Begin His Work Here on Second Sunday of April--Other Assignments of Local Interest.

PRINTED TAFFETAS AND EMBROIDERED CREPES STRONG IN FAVOR FOR SUMMER FROCKS.

The embroidered crepes are among the daintiest of materials for the necessary and typical summer frock. Japanese and Dolly Varden motifs, some of them slightly raised, are the designs most generally noted; they are youthful and pleasing. The printed taffetas show these same figures on darker grounds and are especially favored for afternoon frocks.

Bordered materials are also used considerably; in fact, any fabric that is sheer and transparent is modish. In the one-piece gowns the flare is noticed at the hips; on many of the new imported models this is brought about by a puffed or draped arrangement of the material or chiffon in the back and over the hips.

The frock illustrated in No. 2165 is especially suited to the broader, gaudy in which it is fashioned; it

clothes the back, has a kimono sleeved gathered gump of net and a two-piece tunic which falls over a straight skirt. For a girl of 16 this design requires 4 1/2 yards of 36 inch material.

A smart contrasting effect is brought out in No. 2121-2275; the odd little bodice with the short, gathered plenum, is developed in a printed taffetas, and the skirt is made of a striped taffetas. There is a circular tunic on the skirt, set on just below the waistline, which lends the costume an unusually chic air.

To copy this frock in size 36, the bodice requires 2 1/2 yards of 36 inch material and the skirt 8 1/2 yards of the same width.
