TODAY LAST DAY FILING FOR COUNTY OFFICES

Some of the Candidates Named by Democrats Are Sherman G. Brown, Liberty, Auditor; Charles Blink, Jr., Rhodes, Clerk; Robert E. Johnson, County Attorney; J. G. Edgar, Sheriff.

A complete list of democratic candidates for county offices, with the exception of coroner, was filed by Robert E. Johnson, chairman of the county democratic committee, late Friday afternoon. Today is the last day that candidates for county offices can file. Candidates for township offices have up to and including May 16 in which to file their petitions.

"DICK" WRIGHT DEAD.

Early Colored Barber of City Succumbs to Long Illness. After being a helpless invalid for over seven years, Richard W. Wright, one of the early colored barbers of the city, and a resident of Marshalltown since about 1855, died at the county hospital at 5:45 Friday evening of a pneumonia and other complications arising from a paralytic condition. Mr. Wright was stricken with paralysis seven years ago Feb. 10. Five weeks ago a second stroke was suffered, and two weeks ago Friday Mr. Wright was taken to the county hospital for treatment.

Like many other colored men born in the days of slavery, Mr. Wright had no very complete record of his birth. He was born in 1847 in Richmond, Va., and his mother, a young slave, died when her son was a baby. Wright's father was a white man, the master of his mother.

In 1862 Wright, in company with two other colored lads, was brought to Cedar Rapids as an unrefugee. John E. Stubbs, who enlisted in Company M, First infantry, and who was later made captain of Company D, Twelfth infantry, and still later became a major and colonel of the Twelfth, was the man who brought Wright north. He was taken into the family of James Hever, a pioneer barber of Cedar Rapids, and was employed by Mr. Hever as a coachman and general all-around man.

About 1885 Wright, then a lad of about 17, came to this city and learned the barber business under "Uncle Joe" Walker, who was destined to become Wright's father-in-law. Wright worked for Walker seven or eight years, and then went into business for himself under the City Bank, now the First National. After several years in that shop Wright moved to under the Western Union Telegraph Company's office, now the site of the Iowa Savings Bank, First avenue and Main, where he was in business for twenty years, or until he was stricken with paralysis. Mr. Wright is survived by his widow and three of his eight children. Mrs. Wright was formerly Sarah Walker, and became the wife of Mr. Wright May 4, 1889. The living children are Herbert Wright, for five years past United States consul at Puerto Cabello, Venezuela, and for four years consul at Uta, Honduras; Miss Myrtle Wright, who is a patient at the county hospital; and Fred Wright, of Davenport. The eldest son, Clarence, and the first, second, and youngest daughters, Stella, Blanche, and Ruth, died in infancy. Flossie, the fourth daughter, became Mrs. S. L. Hurst, and died at Clinton Jan. 27, 1908.

Funeral services will be held from the Methodist church Sunday afternoon at 2:30, in charge of Rev. R. E. Hurlburt. Burial will be in Riverside.

DANIEL BROWN DEAD.

Aged Man of Laurel Succumbs to Paralysis and Old Age. Daniel Brown, aged 76, an old resident of the Laurel neighborhood, who at one time lived both in this city and State Center, died at his home, two miles northeast of Laurel, at 5:15 this morning of paralysis brought on by old age.

Mr. Brown was born at Betzingen, Germany, Oct. 5, 1837. He came to America when a young man and went to State Center, where he lived about a year. He then came to this city and worked in a bakery owned by George Stutz and Mr. Kuehner. While living here he married Miss Louisa Brand, Oct. 8, 1872. A year later Mr. and Mrs. Brown moved to the farm near Laurel. Eleven children, in addition to Mrs. Brown, survive their father. They are Mrs. D. H. Paul, George, Fred, Dan, Harry, Margaret, Joseph, and Earl. Brown, all of near Laurel; Mrs. W. R. Aldridge, Wetser, Idaho; Mrs. E. G. Butler, Lake Crystal, Minn.; and Charles Brown, Gilmore City. Two brothers are living in Germany. The funeral will be held from the home Monday afternoon at 2. Interment will be in Graceland cemetery, Laurel.

MRS. CATHERINE PAINTER DEAD.

Old Resident of County Dies Suddenly. While visiting at Okaloosa, Mrs. Catherine Painter, widow of Isaac Painter, died suddenly Friday in Okaloosa at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. F. Guthrie, where she had been visiting for six weeks. Death was due to heart disease.

Mrs. Painter was born Catherine Elizabeth Bullman, and was a daughter of Dr. Aaron Bullman, of Tyler county, Virginia, where Mrs. Painter was born July 1, 1842. When his daughter Catherine was 11 years old Dr. Tyler came west and settled in Henry,

Ill. Later the family came to Iowa, lived at Toronto, in Clinton county, and at New Philadelphia, Boone county. Miss Bullman became the wife of James B. Lackey on Dec. 31, 1860, at Nevada, Mo. Five children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Lackey, and three of them are living. They are Francis A. Lackey, of Melbourne; William K. Lackey, of Ferguson; and Mrs. Sarah A. Guthrie, of Okaloosa. Mr. Lackey died at Nelson, Neb., in 1892. Mrs. A. Bowman, Jr., 107 South Fourth street, is a granddaughter of Mrs. Painter.

Eight years after the death of her husband Mrs. Lackey became the wife of Isaac Painter, the wedding taking place May 16, 1890. Mrs. Painter was a member of Marshall Lodge, No. 40, B. O. E. Degrees, in the Baptist church of this city. The body will be brought to this city this evening, and the funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at 1:30 from the Baptist church, Rev. A. F. Colver officiating.

FORMER STATE CENTER MAN DIES

David D. Zilm Dies at Kansas City After Year's Illness. David D. Zilm, a former resident of State Center, and son of C. C. Zilm, of State Center, died at Kansas City of a creeping paralysis.

Mr. Zilm was born on a farm near State Center, Dec. 19, 1873. He married Miss Maude Strickler, who survives her husband with three children. Richard, aged 16; Hubert, aged 12; and Fred, aged 10. Mr. Zilm reached State Center today, and the funeral will be held from the Methodist church Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, in charge of Rev. C. J. Rose. Burial will be in Hillside.

TILE COMPANY SUED

Suits Aggregating \$20,021 on Promissory Notes Brought Against Marshalltown Sewer Pipe and Tile Company. Suits for an aggregate of \$20,021.14 were filed in the district court this forenoon against the Marshalltown Sewer Pipe and Tile Company and its officers, and directors. The suits were brought by the Marshalltown State Bank and First National Bank of this city, and the Hostler, Coal and Coke Company, Chicago.

All the suits are brought on promissory notes. The Marshalltown State Bank sues on two notes, one for \$5,000 and the other for \$10,000, dated Aug. 3, 1913. The First National Bank sues on a note for \$4,000, dated Aug. 7, 1913. Warren Overpack, P. J. Fish, J. S. Gilbert, John E. Johnson, and W. C. Horn, and F. J. Gary are made defendants as guarantors on the notes.

Warren Overpack is made a defendant in the suit brought by the Hostler Coal and Coke Company. It sued on two notes for \$1,021.14 dated Sept. 15, 1913.
