Harvest of Small Grain Under Way

The harvest of small grain in the country is well under way, and promises fully as large yields as were indicated by prospects earlier in the season.

All of the hay has been cut, all of the winter wheat is in the shock and a great deal of oats have been cut. Within a week all of this grain and what spring wheat was planted will also be in the shock and stack.

The yield of oats is going to be large per acre, and the yield of wheat, especially winter wheat, will also be good, probably above the average. The timothy crop is good, altho not exceptionally heavy per acre, in some places the stand was quite thin.

Pasture continues good, altho in places it is getting short and is show-

ing the need of soaking rains, but not much of it has begun to brown and burn. Corn is booming and much of it is in the silk. Altho it has not yet shown the effect of the dry, hot weather, it would be benefited by some rain.

SECOND LUNDE CHILD DIES.

Quarry Family Bereaved Again as Result of Diphtheria.

Mr. and Mrs. Peter Lundie, of Quarry, whose baby daughter, Ruth, aged 2, died a week ago Monday of diphtheria, were bereaved again this morning when their son, Sigurd, aged 14, died of paralysis of the bowels resulting from diphtheria.

The boy had been sick for almost two weeks, but was able to be up Sunday, when the paralysis set in. He was born Feb. 1, 1900.

His parents, four brothers and a sister, Mabel, Florid, William, Paul and Theodore, ranging from 5 to 18 years old, survive. Two of these children have had diphtheria. Burial in Pleasant

Hill cemetery will take place from the residence Friday morning at 10:30.
