JURY ACQUITS ACCUSED WOMAN AFTER DELIBERATING FIFTY MINUTES.

PROCURATOR-GENERAL IS MILD IN FINAL ARGUMENT

Wild Scene in Court Room When Verdict is Announced—Cheers Mingled With Abusive References at Slaying of Calmette—Trial One of Most Sensational in Paris Courts.

Paris, July 29.—Madame Henriette Caillaux Tuesday night was acquitted by a jury in the court of assizes of the wilful murder on March 16 last of Gaston Calmette, editor of the Figaro. The verdict was returned after fifty minutes' deliberation. The announcement was followed by the wildest tumult.

Mme. Caillaux staggered and then threw her arms about the neck of her counsel, Fernand Labori. Her hair was undone, falling over her shoulders, and her hat dropped to the floor. The spectators stood upon desks and chairs. "Caillaux, Assassine!" mingled into one.

The din was deafening. Several groups of barristers came to blows and the republicans, in an endeavor to separate them, joined in the melee. The spectacle of Labori and Chenu, the latter counsel for the Calmette family, embracing each other, calmed the tumult for a moment, but it was redoubled when they left with Mme. Caillaux.

Falling to make himself heard, the presiding judge, followed by the other judges, marched out of the room. The advocates took complete possession of the court: some of them mounted the benches and addressed the crowd. The guards then cleared a portion of the room and comparative quiet was restored. Judge Albaladeu then returned and read the judgment, ordering the release of Mme. Caillaux. Shaken with the emotion, the guards making a lane thru the crowd. She covered her face with her hands as if to shield herself from the furious cries of "Murderess!"

By way of a number of narrow corridors and back staircases she reached a small side door in the palace of justice where an automobile was waiting and drove off unobserved.

M. Caillaux left by the main entrance on the arm of his devoted friend, Deputy Paschal Ocaud, amid mingled cheers and booms.

Sensational Trial Ended. Thus ended the most sensational trial with which Parisian courts have had to deal in years. Each day provided its dramatic thrill and the verdict was pronounced, the outcome can not be forgotten.

The session was devoted to speeches by counsel. Mme. Caillaux had some into the prisoners' dock pale and worn. She collapsed during the course of the address of Maître Chenu, who scored her bitterly.

The speech of the procurator-general Jules Herbaux, was unusually mild in tone. To the jurors he said: "Your duty as the defenders of the interests of society require you to find a verdict of guilty but no one expects you to be pitiless."

Maître Labori is eloquent. He delivered a masterpiece of passionate eloquence. He closed amid a tempest of applause, saying: "My wish is that Mme. Caillaux shall leave here acquitted and that the press shall be purified. Let us keep our anger for our enemies abroad. Let us leave this court resolute and united to face the perils which threaten us."

DIVISION OF AUTO TAX.

Counties to Get Nearly Quarter Million From Fees. Des Moines, July 29.—Division of the automobile tax receipts by W. C. Brown, treasurer of state, has begun apportioning the automobile tax for 1914. Automobile owners this year paid the state \$253,874 in fees, and before Aug. 1 the department expects the number of cars registered to pass the 100,000 mark.

The first apportionment of the automobile fund is made April 1 each year. The second is made on Aug. 1. The sum on hand to be divided at present is \$249,555.60.

The checks will be prepared so as to be mailed to treasurer of each county late this week. The apportionment will be by townships. Each county will receive \$151,888 for each township. Polk county, having twenty-two townships, will receive \$3,341.36. Sixty-three townships in Polk county received \$7,648.96 from the automobile fund, so that the total amount this county will receive this year is \$10,990.32.

Polk county has about 2,500 automobiles and paid in about \$25,000 in registration fees last year. On April 1, 1914, the state apportioned \$571,238.24 among the counties. The fund this time is \$249,555, making a total of \$820,793.30. This represents 85 per cent of \$956,874.00 received by the state for the registration of automobiles.

Yesterday the last car number issued was 899,232. On Aug. 1 the fees for registering new cars will be cut in two for the remainder of the year.

Baptist Association to Plan Ways of Bringing in Men. Davenport, July 29.—More men in the church is the aim of the Davenport Baptist Association which is to hold its annual convention in Calvary Baptist church, Davenport, Sept. 8 to 10. The churches in the association include those in Muscatine, Iowa City, Clinton and Davenport, and smaller towns between these cities. About 100 delegates are expected to attend. The first session will be held at 7:30 o'clock Tuesday evening, Sept. 8.

The program for the convention is being prepared with the idea of emphasizing the importance of the men's work in the church. On Wednesday night, the second day of the convention, a banquet for men will be held and six laymen will speak. The Baptist men's chorus of Clinton will furnish the music.

WANTS IN UNION STATION.

Ft. D., D. M. & S. Railway Sues to Gain Admission to Union Station. Des Moines, July 29.—The Fort Dodge, Des Moines and Southern Railway Company filed a petition in the United States district court at Des Moines Monday asking for a mandatory injunction compelling the Des Moines Union Railway Company to permit it to enter the union station.

Formal application for admission to the depot was made by the complainant on July 16 last. F. C. Hubbell, president of the Des Moines union, refused the request, stating that the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul and Washburn railroads, which are stockholders in the company were unwilling to give their consent.

The Fort Dodge railroad officials assert that they are entitled to enter the union station under the provisions of an ordinance enacted by the city council of Des Moines on Feb. 7, 1898, known as the union depot ordinance.

This ordinance provided, according to the plaintiff, that any railroad that thereafter operating might be permitted to use the union station as a terminal on an equal basis with those companies using it.

First Heat Prostration. Koert Longerbeam, of Iowa City, Overcome While Working on Building. Special to Times-Republican. Iowa City, July 29.—The first real heat prostration of the season here came yesterday when Koert Longerbeam, a workman at the university hospital, was overcome. He fell unconscious, to the floor, and was senseless for an hour before surgeons could revive him. He is still unable to leave his bed, but it is believed he will recover, after hours of suffering.

WOMAN'S CLOTHES FOUND. Des Moines Police Wondering Whether Find is Clue to Missing Woman.

Des Moines, July 29.—A basket of women's clothes found near the municipal bath house last evening by Melvin Gillett may serve as a clue to the fate of Mrs. James Weaver, wife of a prominent farmer, who mysteriously disappeared from her home two weeks ago.

The basket was brought to police headquarters by Detective William Bailey last night. It contained a purse, a checked skirt, a white waist, a hat and several other articles of apparel. The officers found nothing by which to identify the clothes.

Employees of the bath house claim to have seen a middle aged woman standing on the beach two nights ago. She seemed to be wandering aimlessly about, according to reports. She disappeared suddenly and was not seen again. The clothes were found last evening. They were cut almost in shreds, according to Chief of Detectives Jackson.

When last seen, the missing Mrs. Weaver was wearing a white waist and brown hat similar to the ones found in the basket. She is said to have been
