LA SALLE'S LAST COLONY.

California Professor Claims New Knowledge of French Explorer.
That he has found the exact spot on which La Salle, the great French explorer, located his last colony on the shores of the Gulf of Mexico, and that he has proven accepted history wrong in this regard to the death place of La Salle are claims of Dr. Herbert E. Bolton, of the University of California, who writes from San Antonio after a trip thru the historic regions of his search.
According to Bolton the La Salle colony was located on the Garcitas river about five miles from its mouth, and not as historians have agreed, on the Lavaca river, an affluent of Matagorda Bay. Furthermore, Bolton asserts, La Salle met his death on the Brazos river near the present city of Navasota, and not on the Trinity river near Dallas.
Bolton claims to have been guided in his search by the discovery of records of an unknown Spanish expedition to Matagorda Bay in 1690, the year after the destruction of the French colony. These maps, he says, show in detail the river lines, and the location of the precise spot where the remnants of the La Salle colony were found. Bolton says he not only stood upon this spot, but that he upturned foundations of buildings and four vases, porcelain bowls, and other utensils of that period. He is to bring back to the university a mass of photographic evidence.—San Francisco Chronicle.
