## ANSONS TAKE LAST FROM THE ORPHANS

RETURN FROM HARD TRIP WITH THREE OF FOUR GALESBURG GAMES.

HARTER PITCHES GOOD GAME, WILKUS HIT HARD

Orphans Take Early Lead, and With 3 to 2 in Seventh Ansons Have Rally and Score Four—Two More Annexed in Ninth—Team Returns With Cripples and Three New Recruits.

The Ansons reached home at 11 o'clock today from the hardest trip they have had this season, but encouraged over the showing made at Galesburg, where the team won yesterday, making three out of the four taken from the Orphans.

Harter pitched a good game Monday, holding the Orphans to eight hits, striking out eight men, and passing two. Wilkus was hit hard, especially in the seventh, when four runs were garnered with the Orphans holding a lead of one at the opening of the frame.

Orphans Take Two to Begin. The Orphans started out encouragingly in the opening round by scoring two runs with two hits, a base on balls, and single by Mulligan. The Ansons came back with one, Jude hitting, being sacrificed by Bromley, and scoring on a single by Bergwald.

In the third the Ansons evened up the score when Seibert hit, went to second on Andreen's sacrifice, and to third on Harter's out. Harvey walked, and with Seibert executed a double steal that scored Seibert after two were out.

The Orphans went their opponents one better in the fourth, when they added another tally, and for three straight innings the Ansons were unable to connect in bunches. The seventh, however—the lucky seventh—told a different story. Every one got on his batting goggles and hit the ball.

Bergwald has been showing up very well, especially as a pinch hitter. He played for a short time this year with Burlington when Lunte was off owing to an injury.
