PAPER TAGS TO BE HIGH

Justices Notified by County Attorney to Enter Judgment for Amount of Automobile Licenses and Forward Money to State.

That cardboard automobile numbers may come high, like other commodities, yet not affected by the war in Europe so much as a local war on the practice of using automobile license numbers contrary to law, is indicated by a notification issued to justices of the peace by County Attorney B. O. Tankersley.

In the recent cases against owners running under dealers' paper tag numbers, all that was indicated in the proceedings was the assessment of fine and costs.

Mr. Tankersley has instructed the justices that they must not only fine the defendants in these cases, but they must enter judgment against them for the amount of license due the state, collect the same, and forward it to the treasury before the month of October. The law is declared to be plain, and the court has no recourse but to act under the statutes, regardless of whether or not the owner of the car has already sent for his license. In some cases the owner would be compelled to pay two licenses for his automobile when one would do, providing he insisted that he receive his metal dealers' number tag for the time allowed him to secure his own number.
