

CONTEST PROMISED OVER ELZY ESTATE

JOHN C. ELZY, SON, FILES OBJECTIONS TO PROBATING OF FATHER'S WILL.

ALLEGES THAT FATHER WAS UNSOUND OF MIND

Son Alleges Not to Have Received \$50,000 of Advances From His Father as Objections Aver Is Stated in the Will—Claim Made That Will Is Not Last Testament of Decedent.

A contest over the large estate left by Robert A. Elzy, a well-to-do contractor of this city, is promised in objections to the probating of the will that was filed this morning for John C. Elzy, of St. Paul, Minn., a son of the decedent. A long list of objections advanced why the will should not be admitted to probate.

Chief among them are the allegations that the will was not the last will and that it was made at a time when Elzy was sick and not in a mental condition to make a will. It is alleged further that he was of unsound mind when the will was drawn. Undue influence is likewise alleged.

In support of the contention that Elzy was of unsound mind when the will was drawn, it is alleged that the will makes gross misstatements in regard to the amount R. A. Elzy had advanced his son. It is alleged in the objections that the will says this amount is \$50,000, when the objection sets forth that the son had advanced from his father only \$10,000. This alleged misstatement, the objections say, "is proof positive that R. A. Elzy was not in a sound condition of mind."

Still another objection advanced is that the will was not executed according to law.

The estate is being administered by special administrators, the widow, Mrs. Rachel A. Elzy, and the decedent's brother, W. J. Elzy. The will has been set for probate in a few weeks.

LIQUOR CASE TO JURY.

First Criminal Trial Finished—C. H. Carkhuff Placed on Trial. The first of the liquor cases being tried in the district court was finished this forenoon, and the second one was begun. The case against George Sellers was given to the jury at 10:30 o'clock. The jury had not returned a verdict at noon. C. H. Carkhuff, indicted for selling and keeping for sale intoxicating liquor, was then placed on trial. The jury was secured, and part of the evidence for the state had been introduced, when court adjourned at noon.

The most important evidence for the state in both cases was given by Edward R. Wolfe and George W. Parkinson, detectives of the Burns agency, who made the investigation against both Sellers and Carkhuff in April. They testified of sales made to them by Sellers. His defense was an alibi, and witnesses testified in his behalf that Sellers was in Des Moines April 22, the day the state's witness testified sales of whiskey were made.

Carkhuff was an occupant of the Brenneke building, formerly the "Maple Leaf" saloon. The detectives testified against him that several parties of five bottles of whiskey were made from him in this building. When the sheriff's officers searched the place they found the coal shed in the rear equipped with electric lights, a bar and chairs.


