

HOUSE IS ALMOST LOST BY DEMOCRATS

Large Majority Reduced to Minimum by Tuesday's Election in Various Districts.

SLIGHT LEAD IN SENATE APPARENTLY RETAINED BY DEMOCRATS.

HEAVY FALLING OFF IN PROGRESSIVE PARTY VOTE

Roosevelt Followers Retain Position in Only One State, California—Returns Indicate Party as Effective Organization Has Been Absorbed by Republicans.

New York, Nov. 4.—The democratic party thru yesterday's election apparently retained control of both branches of congress altho gains made by the republicans in the lower house threatened to reduce the democratic majority to a minimum. This is the outstanding feature of yesterday's election, beside which was the significant development of the dwindling away of the strength of the progressive party.

Returns indicate that the progressive who cast a larger vote than the republicans in 1912, have been absorbed in large part by that party. In almost every case there was a decided falling off in the vote with the exception of California, which apparently has re-elected Hiram Johnson governor.

Republican Leaders Elated. The result of state elections was less definite. In a number of cases democratic administrations were overturned but these were offset by instances in which the reverse was the case. Republican leaders were elated, however, by the showing made in New York, where District Attorney Charles S. Whitman was elected to succeed Governor Glynn, the democratic incumbent, by what bids fair to be a record vote. As the late returns came in M. Whitman's plurality mounted steadily and by evening it was estimated that he would win by nearly 150,000. In Pennsylvania there was a huge increase in the republican vote.

Democrats Elected to Senate. Complete returns showed the following democrats elected to the senate: Oscar W. Underwood, Alabama; Marcus A. Smith, Arizona; James P. Clarke, Arkansas; Duhan U. Fletcher, Florida; Hoke Smith, long term, Georgia; Thomas W. Hardwick, term ends 1919, Georgia; J. C. W. Beckham, long term, and John M. Camden, term ends March 3, 1915, Kentucky; R. F. Broussard, Louisiana; William J. Stone, Mississippi; Lee S. Brown, North Carolina; James M. Penrose, Oklahoma; Eli H. Hays, South Carolina; John Walter Smith, Maryland.

Republican Wins in Hawaii. Honolulu, Nov. 4.—The republicans were successful in the election held here yesterday, winning the territorial and municipal offices with few exceptions. Hon. J. K. Kalaniano'ole (Prince Cupid) was re-elected delegate to congress by 3,000 plurality.

Republicans Lead in Colorado. Denver, Nov. 4.—Five hundred and seven precincts in thirty-six counties, including 149 in the city of Denver, give: Governor, Carlson, 62,564; Patterson, 40,347. Three hundred eighty-four precincts, including 145 in Denver, give Senator, Thomas, democrat, 34,025; Work, republican, 32,458. Four hundred fifty-six precincts including 149 in Denver, give: Dry, 51,218; wet, 50,432.

Nevada Elected Republican Senator. Carson, Nov. 4.—Samuel Platt, republican, for United States senator, continued to increase his lead over Francis G. Newlands, democrat, in the returns today from yesterday's election in Nevada. Fifty-eight precincts out of 240 in the state give Platt 3,197, Newlands 2,861.

California Election Close. San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Complete returns from 834 out of 4,535 precincts in the state give for senator: Joseph R. Knowland, republican, 26,598; James D. Phelan, democrat, 27,236; Francis J. Heney, progressive, 18,205.

Republicans Gain in New Jersey. On the basis of actual returns the republicans gained ten in New York, five in Connecticut, one in Delaware, twelve in Illinois, two in Indiana, one in Maryland, three in Massachusetts, two in Michigan, two in New Hampshire, five in New Jersey, one in New Mexico, one in Ohio, six in Pennsylvania, one in Rhode Island, one in South Dakota, and one in West Virginia.

SMALL MARGIN IN CONGRESS. Democrats Held Own in Senate and Lost Heavily in House.

Washington, Nov. 4.—Altho eighty-five congressional districts were unheard from at noon today, demo-

cratic leaders here were confident that the administration would retain control altho the majority in the house might be cut from 141 to as low as 25 or 30. After a conference at the White House with President Wilson, democratic leaders estimated that democratic majority might possibly stand at 30. The democratic majority in the senate was estimated at ten.

The varying reports of the senate contest in Nevada, California, Kansas and Colorado gave no promise of reducing the democratic majority of eight. Reports to the national democratic committee were said to indicate the election of James D. Phelan, of California, to succeed Senator Perkins, republican, and the re-election of Senators Newlands and Thomas, in Nevada and Colorado.

In Kansas a close contest for the seat of Senator Bristow seemed to be between Representative Murdock, progressive, and former Senator Curtis, republican, leaving Representative Neeley, the democratic candidate, behind.

At noon with eighty-five congressional districts missing the election of 135 democrats, 162 republicans and 3 progressives was reported. The present complexion of the house is 285 democrats, 29 republicans, 15 progressives and 29 vacancies.

Republican Candidate For Governor Looks Like Winner in Colorado. Denver, Nov. 4.—George A. Carlson, republican, maintained his lead for governor over Thomas M. Patterson, democrat, according to returns received up to 9:30 this morning. At that hour 383 precincts in twenty-nine counties, including 105 in Denver, gave Carlson 44,728; Patterson, 24,820.

One hundred thirty-six precincts, including twenty-six in Denver, give: Senator—Work, republican, 10,182; Thomas, democrat, 7,512. Three hundred and twenty-two precincts gave, dry, 30,194; wet, 24,725.

Republican Leads in Oregon. Portland, Ore., Nov. 4.—Returns from 584 precincts out of 1,467 in Oregon, every county being heard from, give: Governor Gill, progressive, 32,112; Smith, democrat, 5,971; U'ren, independent, 269; Withycombe, republican, 8,850.

Prohibition: For, 5,411; against, 4,177. Governor Cox Concedes Defeat. Columbus O., Nov. 4.—Governor James Cox, democrat, this morning conceded his own defeat at the polls yesterday and sent a telegram of congratulations to Frank B. Willis, republican, who will succeed him in office.

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REPUBLICAN GAINS EVERYWHERE

Cox, Democrat, Beaten in Ohio; Sullivan Loses in Illinois; Results in Various States Show Democrat Losses.

Incomplete returns from yesterday's elections today showed these results: MASSACHUSETTS. Governor David I. Walsh, democrat, re-elected by 10,000.

Republicans gained control congressional delegation. Republicans seem to have elected most state offices with exception of governor and have legislative majority. Complete vote for governor: Walsh, democrat, 263,524; McCall, republican, 196,800; Walker, progressive, 34,207.

OHIO. Frank B. Willis, republican, elected governor over James M. Cox, democrat, present governor. Warren C. Harding, republican, elected senator over T. S. Hogan, democrat.

Elected twelve republican and ten democratic members of congress. Defeated state prohibition and woman's suffrage. Constitutional amendment for repeal of county local option law still in doubt.

IOWA. Senator A. B. Cummins, republican, re-elected by about 25,000 or more. Governor Clarke, republican, re-elected by 20,000.

NEW YORK. Charles S. Whitman, republican, former district attorney of New York City, defeated Governor Martin Glynn, democrat, for governor.

ILLINOIS. Republicans claim the re-election of Lawrence Y. Sherman, republican, by 15,000. Progressives are a poor third.

MISSOURI. William J. Stone, democrat, re-elected senator. Democratic state ticket successful. Eleven democrats and two republicans elected to congress.

INDIANA. Senator B. F. Shively, democrat, re-elected. Entire democratic state ticket elected. Progressives poor third.

ABANDON THEIR PRISONERS AND WOUNDED IN RETIREMENT ACCORDING TO FRENCH.

ALTERNATE SUCCESSSES BETWEEN DIXMUDE AND LYS

General Result is That Allies Have Made Perceptible Progress, According to Official Statement of French War Office—Germans Report Failure of Russians on Turkish Frontier.

London, Nov. 4.—"The sound of cannon has been distinctly heard at Ghent," telegraphs the Amsterdam correspondent of the Central News, "and there is every indication that the Germans are retiring on the whole front from Bruges to Thiele, fifteen miles southwest of Bruges."

Paris, Nov. 4.—The French war office today gave out an official announcement as follows: "On our left wing to the north the situation shows no change. The enemy has drawn back on the right bank of the Yser. We have recaptured Lombartryde. The Germans occupy on the left bank of the Yser nothing more than the head of a bridge, half way between Dixmude and Nieuport. They have abandoned, in addition, made prisoners and captured a considerable quantity of war material including artillery, which was held immovable by the mud."

Between Dixmude and the Lys the fighting has continued with alternate advances and withdrawals, made public by the general report that the allied forces have made perceptible progress. "Between the Lys and the region of Arras there has been cannonading and minor engagements. "Between the region of Arras and the east of Le Quesnoy-en-Santerre."

INDICATES GERMAN RETREAT. Advancing Allied Army Find Only Small Force on Yser Front.

Havre, via Paris, Nov. 4.—The Belgian minister of war today made public an official report received by him from Furnes, on the Belgian coast, half way between Dunkirk and Ostend, the text of which is as follows: "Detachments of allied troops which today pushed ahead as far as Lombartryde, on the Yser front, below Schoorbakke, failed to discover any of the enemy. Only small detachments of artillery still remain in the direction of Westende and to the north and east of Schoorbakke. Small portions of the enemy's rear guard still are holding several bridges and farm houses on the left bank of the river near Stuyvenkenkerke."

Russians Lose on Turkish Frontier. Berlin, via wireless, Nov. 4.—Information was given out to the press from official quarters today as follows: "The first encounters on the Turkish frontier, in which Turkish soldiers met

RUSSIAN TROOPS, RESULTED UNSUCCESSFULLY FOR THE RUSSIANS. "Nineteen Russian transports sunk by the Turks had on board 1,700 mines destined for the blockading of Turkish waters. This fact proves the hostile intentions of the Russians."

UNFAVORABLE IMPRESSION CREATED. "The Gazette del Popolo says that the present treatment of Germans in England is a policy open to question as numerous English industries are conducted by Germans who would be difficult to replace. "Sir Edward Grey's denunciation of Turkey, handed to the Italian government by the British ambassador, has created in Italian official circles an impression unfavorable to England as it shows England's fear of Turkey."

BRITISH OPERATIONS UNSUCCESSFUL. British warships on Nov. 1, says an official communication issued here today, bombarded the Turkish fort of Akabeh and attempted a landing. The force re-embarked after losing four men.

DISPATCHES FROM CONSTANTINOPLE SAY A RUSSIAN SQUADRON BOMBARDED THE DARDANIELS AT DAYBREAK ON NOV. 3. They did no damage. The firing was at extreme range and lasted fifteen minutes. Simultaneously it is reported two British cruisers fired a few shots at the seaport of Jaffa in Palestine but retired under the fire of Turkish artillery.

AN ANNOUNCEMENT GIVEN OUT IN VIENNA SAYS AUSTRIAN FORCES IN POLAND, AFTER HOLDING THE RUSSIANS IN CHECK ON THE LYSAGORA, CONTINUED THEIR RETIRING MOVEMENT TO POSITIONS PREVIOUSLY SEIZED BY THEM.

INSURGENTS NUMBER 10,000. According to official information given out in Berlin today certain firms in Amsterdam have been informed of South Africa that the insurgents in the Union of South Africa number 10,000 men. They have in their possession quick fiers and machine guns. The British war supplies in the Cape Colonies are described as insufficient.

A DISPATCH FROM COPENHAGEN, ACCORDING TO OFFICIAL INFORMATION, SAYS THE PERSIAN MINISTER TO PETROGRAD HAS DEMANDED THE IMMEDIATE RECALL OF THE RUSSIAN FORCES OF OCCUPATION IN PERSIA.

RUSSIA FOR SOME TIME PAST, HAS MAINTAINED GARRISONS IN THE NORTHERN PORTION OF PERSIA. Germans Announce Slow Progress. Berlin, via London, Nov. 4.—An official communication was given out at German army headquarters today as follows: "Our attacks on Ypres to the north of Arras and to the east of Solissons are progressing slowly but successfully. "South of Arras and in the Vesges, French attacks have been repulsed. "In the eastern arena of the war there have been no material developments."

Russians Enter Turkey. Petrograd, Nov. 4.—An official communication from the staff of the army in the Caucasus says the Russian troops have crossed the Turkish frontier, driving back the enemy's advance guards and taking a number of towns. Turkish Ambassador Quits France. Paris, Nov. 4.—Rifist Pasha, the Turkish ambassador to France, according to the Havas News Agency, asked for his passports which were handed to him at Bordeaux this morning.

Japs Capture 800 Germans. Tokyo, Nov. 4.—A dispatch received here from Tsai Nan, in Shantung province, China, says the Japanese forces before Tsing Tau, the fortified German position of the German territory of Kiau Chau, have destroyed twenty-six German guns and captured 800 prisoners.

The Japanese artillery is now attacking the German trenches and the wire entanglements before them.

CUMMINS, CLARKE, SOLID DELEGATION

Connolly Defeated 30,000 in Iowa and Hamilton For Governor Loses by 20,000.

MICHIGAN. Governor W. N. Ferris, democrat, re-elected by 15,000 to 30,000 majority over Former Governor Charles S. Osborn, republican.

WISCONSIN. Emmanuel L. Philippa, republican, elected governor. Entire republican state ticket successful.

VERMONT. William P. Dillingham, republican, re-elected governor. Republican retained control congressional delegation, state officers and legislature.

KENTUCKY. J. C. Beckham and Johnson M. Camden, both democrats, elected to senate. Democratic congressmen elected in nine and republicans in two districts.

KANSAS. Arthur Capper, republican, elected governor. Victor Murdock's friends claim his election to senate. Republicans claim success entire state ticket.

NEW JERSEY. New Jersey congressional delegation will stand eight republicans and four democrats, a gain of six republican seats.

RHODE ISLAND. Roger Livingston Beekman, republican, and entire republican state ticket elected. Every city and all but six towns in state voted to license sale of liquor.

CONNECTICUT. Senator Frank B. Brandegee, republican, re-elected. Legislature republican.

SIX STATES REFUSE TO GRANT FRANCHISE TO WOMEN AND CANDIDATES BEATEN. FOUR OTHER STATES REJECT PROHIBITION

Women Candidates Running on Suffrage Tickets Defeated—Vote in Illinois Shows Material Falling Off—Ohio Defeats Prohibition Amendment—Drys Claim Illinois Legislature.

Chicago, Nov. 4.—Woman suffrage suffered a setback in the election yesterday, six states voting against granting the franchise to women and women candidates undergoing defeat at the polls. In Illinois, where women gained the right to vote for all statutory offices only recently, the number of votes cast by that sex fell off greatly.

In Kansas a woman ran for congress in the sixth district and a lively campaign was conducted in her behalf, but the female progressive candidate, Mrs. Morley Murphy, was defeated, running third. In Chicago, Miss Harriet Vittum and Miss Mary McDowell, heads of social settlements, ran for county commissioners, but made a poor showing.

Four States Reject Prohibition. Prohibition was defeated in four states yesterday, with both sides claiming victory in a fifth. California and Washington voted strongly against ousting of saloons. Arizona also decided to remain wet. Colorado, the other western state voting on the subject, is claimed by both the anti-saloon league and those who favor saloons.

Ohio defeated a prohibition amendment also, but in Illinois agents of the anti-saloon league claimed to have gained a victory in electing a legislative committee composed of a majority of prohibition advocates.

Wins in Montana. The woman's suffrage amendment in Montana has carried by "a safe majority" according to a telegram received shortly before noon today by Mrs. Medill McCormick, chairman of the congressional committee of the National Woman's Suffrage Association, from Miss Janette Rankin, of Missouri, the committee's representative in Montana.

Suffrage Vote in Nebraska. Omaha, Nov. 4.—On the suffrage amendment 137 out of the 150 precincts in the state gives 9,576 for and 10,448 against. These include 84 precincts in Omaha, which give a majority of 1,019 against the amendment.

Member of Legislature From Johnson County Beaten by Coast. Special to Times-Republican. Iowa City, Nov. 4.—Twenty out of twenty-six precincts in Johnson county indicate Connolly and Hamilton will carry the county by reduced pluralities, probably near the 500 point. W. O. Coast, republican, probably has been elected to the legislature, defeating George W. Koontz, democrat, mayor of Iowa City and a member of the house for many years.

EMMET COUNTY REPUBLICAN. Cummins and Clarke Have Big Lead and Woods Wins 3 to 1. Special to Times-Republican. IOWA SENDS SOLID REPUBLICAN DELEGATION TO LOWER HOUSE.

SECOND AND SIXTH DISTRICTS REDEEMED

Election of Hull in Second Indicated by Later Returns, Altho Vote is Close—Democratic Counties Show Great Gains For Both Cummins and Clarke—Close in Eleventh District.

Des Moines, Nov. 4.—All returns up to noon confirmed the earlier reports of the day showing a sweeping republican victory in Iowa. At republican headquarters all the returns received strengthened the belief that the republican majority will go over 25,000, and Cummins may have as much as 35,000 over Connolly. Several strong democratic counties reported great gains for Cummins and Clarke.

Hull Wins Out. Scott county gave Cummins 800 and Clarke 600, with 2,000 for Hull, assuring the election of the latter. Calhoun gives Cummins 804 and Clarke 876. All republican members of congress are elected except possibly in the eleventh district, which is in doubt because of a slump in Woodbury and Plymouth counties. Reed at democratic headquarters, refuses to concede the defeat of Connolly or Hamilton, but has no figure for it.

Entire State Ticket Elected. Chairman Rawson stated this morning: "From all reports we have at present the indications are that both Clarke and Cummins have pluralities of over 20,000 and the entire republican state ticket is elected. There is no doubt whatever that the republicans made a splendid victory."

Returns slowly coming in today tended to reduce the plurality of Senator Albert B. Cummins, republican, over Congressman Maurice Connolly, democrat, in yesterday's election. Estimates this afternoon varied from 20,000 to 30,000 plurality, but they were based on one-third the total precincts of the state.

In the governorship race, Clarke's plurality over Hamilton and White also had a tendency to fall. The latest figures indicating a republican plurality of from 7,000 to 12,000. No change in any of the other contests appeared.

DEMOCRATS REFUSE TO GIVE UP. Claim Later Returns May Overcome Lead of Cummins, Clarke and Hull. [By Associated Press.] Des Moines, Nov. 4.—Returns from 752 precincts out of a total of 2,297 in the state and not including Polk county, at noon today gave Cummins for senator 17,658; Connolly 6,415. In 566 precincts reports on governor show Clarke, republican, received 66,773, and Hamilton, democrat, 61,925.

Less than 400 precincts out of a total of 2,297 in the state had reported early today, but the scattered returns received were sufficient to indicate the trend of the vote. It was expected that a day or so would elapse before anything like definite figures on the senatorial contest would be available. Many of the precincts of the state are remote from usual facilities of communication.

Republican leaders claimed Cummins' majority would be nearer 50,000 when the final count was made and the senator himself shared this opinion. On the other hand the democratic headquarters had not conceded the defeat of Connolly early today. Party leaders declared later returns would change the situation.

Democrats also claimed the election of their candidate for congress in the Second district and declared there was yet a chance of John T. Hamilton, their gubernatorial candidate, cutting down governor Clarke's lead sufficiently to give him the election.

Returns today made no change in the state and legislative ticket, the republicans apparently having won all the offices. Nothing like an estimate could be made on the vote for the supreme court. In Polk county Justices Ladd and Weaver and Congressman Prouty were leading their opponents.

"Satisfactory," Says Woods. Estherville, Nov. 4.—Yesterday's election results were most satisfactory," said Congressman Frank P. Woods, chairman of the republican congressional committee here today. "Beyond this statement I have no comment to make at this time," he continued.

Seize Shipping at Constantinople. London, Nov. 4.—The Turkish authorities, according to a Reuter's Telegram Company dispatch from Constantinople, via Sofia, have begun to seize the shipping lying off Constantinople. The ports also has ordered the extinguishing of lighthouse in the Mediterranean Littoral.

Latest Bulletins From Scene of War

Paris, Nov. 4.—The Echo de Paris publishes a dispatch from Belgrade on the Swiss frontier saying that an Anglo-French fleet attacked the Turkish gunboat Durs and the steamer Kiroli at the entrance to the gulf of Thessalon, near Smyrna in Asiatic Turkey. The Turks themselves sunk both vessels to prevent their falling into the hands of the enemy.

Washington, Nov. 4.—American Minister Fletcher at Santiago, Chile, today reported the German naval victory off Coronel, Chile, and the arrival of three German warships at Valparaiso. The damaged God Hope is reported as having escaped with the Glasgow and Otranto.

Copenhagen, Nov. 4.—A fleet of German warships has gathered off the Aland Islands in the Baltic sea, northeast of Stockholm, and is moving toward the entrance to the Gulf of Finland. They evidently were proceeding north and have stopped to await orders.

Amsterdam, via London, Nov. 4.—The Vassische Zeitung published a dispatch from Sofia saying that Turkish warships have sunk the Russian battleship Sinop.
