Council Lets Contract For Doty Street and Varnum's Hill. A resolution to award the contract for grading and widening Doty street, and grading the Varnum hill road and Jerome street near Seventh street to John Herbert & Sons for 18 cents a cubic yard, was passed to its final adoption by the city council this forenoon. Herbert & Sons were the lowest of the three bidders who filed bids last week. City Engineer W. H. Steiner estimates the yardage of the three jobs to be \$5,800 to \$6,000. At the latter estimate the job will cost \$1,080. Doty street is to be widened to a width of sixty-six feet from Ninth to Twelfth street and graded. The Varnum hill road is to be reduced to a grade of about 6 per cent. Jerome street is to be cut down near the intersection of seventh street. The contractors have begun work on Doty street.
