**SUPERVISORS PREPARE FOR RETIREMENT OF COUNTY AUDITOR A. H. WELKER.**

**AUDITOR AND RECORDER—ELECT APPOINT DEPUTIES**

George Enderley, of This City, to Be Deputy County Auditor—Miss Wilkey, Recorder-Elect, Names Miss Fannie Vosburg, of Gilman, to Be Deputy County Recorder.

In preparation for the retirement of County Auditor A. H. Welker from office, and the advancement of Deputy Auditor A. W. Dobson into the office of auditor, the board of supervisors began this morning to check the accounts of that office. When Dobson is checked in Jan. 2, George Enderley, 512 West Linn street, will come into the office as the auditor's deputy.

Enderley is a bookkeeper employed by the Marshall Printing Company, where he has been working for about two years. The deputyship he assumes pays \$75 a month. Enderley is a Republican.

County Auditor Welker has no plans for immediately after his retirement from office. He said he expected to rest for a while, and that he was considering some business openings but had decided on nothing yet.

**Gilman Girl Deputy Recorder.**  
 Miss Nora E. Wilkey, recorder-elect, has appointed Miss Fannie Vosburg, of Gilman, to be deputy recorder. Miss Vosburg will come into the office Jan. 2, when Miss Wilkey takes office, and when the present recorder, Miss Etta Northrup, begins special work in the clerk of court's office. Up to about a year ago Miss Vosburg taught in the Gilman school and rural schools of the county. The deputyship she takes pays \$65 a month.

In addition to these changes there are not many more that will be made in the county offices. There will be no changes in the offices of treasurer, clerk of courts, or sheriff. The only other changes among the county officers are that Charles R. Lynch will succeed D. C. Maytag on the board of supervisors and Ray P. Scott becomes county attorney in the place of B. O. Tankersley.

Will Send Delegation to Waterloo Meeting to Fight For Franchise.

Mason City baseball fans, who have been said to desire a place in the Central association, but who have not shown any signs of active participation in the fight for the Galesburg franchise, have come out with the announcement that they are after a berth and that they will send a large delegation to the Waterloo meeting in January, where they will make a fight for consideration. Up to the present time it seems that Galesburg would have no opposition for membership, but the Mason City announcement moves all thought of a peaceful solution of final make-up of the Central for 1915.

There is no doubt that Mason City would prove a stronger member than Galesburg. The latter city has been tried and found wanting, while Mason City has gone out and raised \$40,000 in two weeks' time for the support of a semi-professional team. "If we can raise \$40,000 for a semi-professional team," declared a Mason City business man, who had taken an interest in the project, "we ought to be able to raise \$20,000 for a first class team."

According to the Waterloo newspapers the fans are counting on the support of Cedar Rapids, Burlington, Marshalltown and Waterloo.
