

# THORNE, COWNIE AND DR. STANGE TO SPEAK

PRINCIPAL FEATURES OF FARMERS' INSTITUTES HAVE BEEN ARRANGED.

CLIFFORD THORNE SPEAKS AT SECOND INSTITUTE, FEB. 6

John Cownie, of Des Moines, and Dr. Charles H. Stange, of Iowa City College, Promise to Speak at First Institute Saturday, Jan. 23—May Show Good Roads "Movies."

Mr. Cownie and Dr. Stange will half-day institutes the Marshall County Farmers' Association has planned for late this month and early in February have been secured. The committee has obtained acceptances for their invitations to Clifford Thorne, of the state railroad commission; John Cownie, of Des Moines; and Dr. Charles H. Stange, of Iowa State College.

The principal speakers for the two speak at the first of the two institutes, the one to be held the afternoon of Saturday, Jan. 23. Clifford Thorne will speak at the second institute, Saturday afternoon, Feb. 6.

Dr. Stange, who is dean of the division of veterinary medicine, will speak about hog cholera and the treatment

with serum and virus for its prevention. The discussion of this subject by so well-known an authority as Dr. Stange promises an interesting presentation, and a good chance to have questions on the subject answered. Cownie will talk on some agricultural subject.

**May Show Road "Movies."**  
There is a possibility that "movies" of road building in Iowa may be shown at the first of these institutes. County Engineer W. W. Morehouse is able to get from the state highway commission for next week one reel of films, showing road building in Iowa. It depicts all phases of road grading and the building of permanent roads. The engineer is seeking a place to show the films where the farmers can see them.

The engineer will try to make arrangements with the committee of the institute to have the reel shown before the farmers of that gathering, if a projecting machine can be secured and placed in the east court room.

**Thorne on Railroad Rates.**  
Clifford Thorne has promised to speak on "Railroad Rates and Taxation" at the second institute. This will be the feature address of this gathering, but an additional short address or two may be added to complete the afternoon. The committee in charge of the institutes in Marshalltown, Iowa, are J. B. Davis, and J. B. Classen.


