### IOWA SPIRITUALISTS' CONVENTION BEGINS

FIRST DELEGATES ARRIVE IN CITY WEDNESDAY NIGHT AND THIS FORENOON.

PRELIMINARY SESSION CONVENTION THIS AFTERNOON

Formal Opening to Be Tonight When Mayor I. S. Millard Will Welcome Delegates—Dr. George B. Warne, of Chicago, to Respond—Summary of Convention Program For Friday.

Delegates began arriving Wednesday night and this forenoon for the annual convention of the Iowa State Spiritualists' Association, which opened at the old Congregational church this afternoon. Among the early arrivals were Dr. and Mrs. George B. Warne, of Chicago, the former president of the National Spiritualists' Association; Mrs. Christina Cooper, of Clinton, secretary of the Mississippi Valley Camp Association; Mrs. Emma Brown, of Cincinnati; Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Whitney, Ottumwa, the former vice president and presiding officer in the place of President C. V. Kempster of Council Bluffs, who can not be here; Mr. and Mrs. Clark Emery, of Ottumwa, the former a trustee, and Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Wilson, of Ottumwa, the former one of the convention speakers.

Convention headquarters were opened at the Pilsener today. This afternoon's session of the convention was only preliminary. The only business transacted was the appointment of a committee on credentials.

Convention Program.

The convention will be formally opened tonight at 7:45, when Mayor I. S. Millard will welcome the delegates. Dr. Warne of Chicago will respond, and E. L. Wilson, of Ottumwa, will deliver the principal address.

Friday's sessions will begin at 10 in the morning, 2 in the afternoon, and 7:45 in the evening. Committees will be appointed at the forenoon session and the president, secretary, treasurer and miscellaneous will read the annual reports. Friday afternoon the committee appointed on constitution and by-laws will report. In the evening H. L. Whitney, vice president, and Mrs. Eva McCoy of this city, will speak. Messages will be received by Mrs. Brown, and the evening's program will contain musical numbers.

#### CLUB HEARS ART TALKS.

Large Attendance at Woman's Club Listens to Descriptions of Galleries.

With an unusually large attendance of about ninety members the regular meeting of the Woman's Club held Wednesday afternoon in the Red Men's hall was very interesting. The program was in charge of the art and music department, of which Mrs. F. S. Wing is chairman. An entertaining program was given by Mrs. Susie White, Mrs. C. F. Schoenhut, Mrs. Ralph E. Keyser and Mrs. Cassie Mullineaux Richards. Mrs. Keyser, who is one of the favorite pianists of the city, played unusually well, opening the program with a rhapsody (D'Albort) which she played brilliantly.

Mrs. White gave a splendid talk describing the art galleries in Belgium and other galleries of Europe and the pictures in them. Mrs. White first told of the beautiful galleries of Brussels and of the many natural beauties of the city. She spoke of the magnificent parks, describing their unusual foliage and trees, especially the elms. She also talked briefly on the present war. She said King Albert, of Belgium, had won the admiration of all Europe.

Mrs. White then talked on the different art galleries, which contain some of masterpieces, mostly of French origin. The architecture of the buildings is the glory of ages. No admittance is charged at any time. The picture in contrast to the other galleries of Europe where not more than two days during the week is the admittance free. Mrs. White described the Palace of Fine Arts, the Brussels Art Gallery which are rich with pictures of every age and contain works of Belgian, Italian, Dutch and Spanish artists. In all these galleries there are from one to twelve originals by Rubens.

In closing Mrs. White told of the Modern Art Gallery, describing its interior decorations which are beautiful. Before closing Mrs. White spoke of Antwerp's famous art gallery which contains productions of Flemish painters of every age, and of all the schools. In the recent siege of Antwerp, many of these wonderful paintings were damaged or destroyed. Two of Van Dyke's most beautiful pictures, "Portrait" and the "Little Boy in Red" are in this gallery. The cathedral of Notre Dame was possibly the cause of the city of Antwerp surrendering to the Germans. The cathedral contains many of Rubens' masterpieces, the altar piece of the church has never been retouched and many of the other pictures have only been retouched once or twice. The wood carving in the church is also wonderful and the Antwerp chimneys, on the church are the finest in the world. Mrs. White then told of the Geneva galleries, one of which contains 250 bibles in different languages and script.

After Mrs. White's talk, Mrs. Cassie Mullineaux Richards, violinist, played two delightful numbers accompanied by Mrs. Keyser. Her first number was "Lombardi" (H. Vieuxtemps) which she played beautifully. "The Fragrance of a Rose" (Wilson G. Howard) was also very pleasing.

Mrs. Schoenhut then gave an interesting talk on the three most costly treasures in the Metropolitan Art Gallery and Museum of New York. The most valuable of all the possessions of the gallery is a unique treasure which can not be duplicated anywhere. This special possession is a bronze chariot, one of the Italian antiquities of special design. The sides are wonderfully carved panels of bronze. The chariot was probably owned by a prince as the household articles, also of bronze, which were found in the tomb, are those used by the families of high rank in the ancient days of Italy. The other two most valuable treasures are two pictures, one by Van Dyke and the

other by Vermeer. These two masterpieces are invaluable and are considered so among the many priceless treasures of this wonderful gallery. Mrs. Schoenhut described the gallery in detail and spoke of the wonderful collection of jade which is the most valuable in the work outside of China. She also told of the different collection, including rugs, paintings, and other treasures of art which are only to be found in this gallery.

After the program the members enjoyed an exhibition of art work which was on display. The out-of-town guests included Mrs. Benjamin Packer, of Victor, Cal.; Mrs. M. E. Cook, of Des Moines, and Mrs. G. H. Wernstrum, of Harris.

#### Becomes Citizen: Given New Name

To receive a new name and to be adopted by a new nation was the experience of Peter Endersen Farkinstad, 12 West Nevada street, in the district court Tuesday. Farkinstad, who is a native of Norway, was naturalized and became an American citizen. Judge Willett, who admitted Farkinstad to citizenship, signed the formal order that substituted the name Pete Endersen Ferkin for Peter Endersen Farkinstad. Farkinstad petitioned the court in his application for citizenship that his name be shortened to Ferkin, the name by which he was commonly known. The fatherland name was too cumbersome for American tongues. It is presumed, Ferkin has been in this country for fourteen years. He is 54 and is a tile ditcher.
