

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MOVE INTO THE ROAD

STATE VETERINARIAN GIBSON'S LATEST ORDER DISARRANGES MOVING DAY.

MANY MUST VACATE WITH NO PLACE TO GO

Farmers Who Were to Have Moved In to Present Quarantine Zone, May Leave Present Homes and Are Restricted From Entering Infected Area

Special to Times-Republican. Clinton, Feb. 27.—March 1, farmers' moving day, will find approximately 200 Clinton farmers' forced to move into the road if State Veterinarian Gibson insists on the order published here today.

In a message to Dr. J. H. Spence, in charge of the foot and mouth quarantine situation in Clinton county, received this morning, Dr. Gibson states that no movements will be permitted in the four five-mile quarantine areas.

In a recent census by mail of farmers in the closed areas it was found that approximately one-third expected to move March 1. As there are over 300 farms in the closed areas 100 farms must be vacated.

Quarantine Violations Expected. It is predicted that there will be many violations of the quarantine regulations Monday and the county officials say they are powerless to stop them if the violations occur in wholesale numbers.

March 1 is moving day in the country because later movements prevent farmers getting in their spring crops and bad weather interferes with earlier changes.

MAKE JURORS BELIEVE

ENTRY IN SUPREME COURT'S RED BOOK HINTS AT JURY TAMING BY COURTS.

JUDGES SEPARATE SHEEP FROM GOATS

Jurors Dismissed in Polk County and New Panel Drawn to Fill Vacancies—Affidavits of Jurors Hint That They Were Dismissed Because They Failed to Find Verdicts Approved by Judge.

Special to Times-Republican. Des Moines, Feb. 27.—A merely incidental happening in the supreme court chambers the other day and an entry in the court's red book of just a few words give the clue to what is really a very important matter in regard to the courts and juries.

The supreme court refused to grant a writ of certiorari in a case brought before it on behalf of a half dozen or more persons who had been discharged from jury duty in Des Moines.

What happened was that four of the five district judges of the Ninth district, which is Polk county, signed an order dismissing certain of the jurors from service because of their work having been completed and no further need of them.

Hint of Jury Curbing. In the affidavits that went up to the supreme court there was some hint of the rumor that the dismissed jurors were told to go because they wouldn't find verdicts as the judges thought they should.
