



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NATIONAL LABOR BUREAU FAVORED

HOUSE COMMITTEE SAYS CONGRESS SHOULD PREVENT UNEMPLOYMENT.

BELIEVES IT HAS POWER TO REMEDY CONDITIONS

Action Urged to Prevent Recurrence of General Enforced Idleness Which Injures Business of Nation—Necessity of Action Denied by No One—Becomes Live Question.

[Special Correspondence.] Washington, March 1.—The committee is convinced that it is in the power of congress by immediate action, which should be taken before another season of unemployment is upon us, to alleviate to a large extent the appalling situation that periodically confronts the country by reason of unemployment and earnestly urges the immediate attention of congress thereto.

This is the conclusion by the house committee on labor in a report submitted to the house on the MacDonald bill for a national employment bureau. The committee favors this bill.

Although it is obviously out of the question for such a bill to be passed by congress before March 4, there is little doubt it will become a live proposition in the next session of congress. If there is an extra session, it will probably come up then.

The subject of the government taking steps to provide for finding employment for the unemployed has been long discussed but little progress has been made in solving the problem. Something, indeed, has been done thru the division of labor to find jobs for immigrants but there is a much wider field to be filled.

MacDonald Bill Provisions. The MacDonald bill creates in the department of labor a national employment bureau, headed by a commissioner of employment at \$5,000 a year. It will be the province of such bureau under direction of the secretary of labor, to provide facilities "whereby employers may obtain the services of persons seeking employment, and persons seeking employment may obtain employment; to provide for giving publicity to applications and demands for employment; and to procure and disseminate such information of industrial conditions as may be pertinent to the purposes of this act."

Applications and demands for employment shall contain a declaration whether a strike or lockout is in progress in the establishment where the work is to be done. The bill also contemplates establishment by the bureau in such places as seem desirable free labor exchanges. The commissioner of employment may assist and co-operate with state or other authorized labor exchanges.

An important provision of the bill is that the postmaster general is authorized and directed to extend to the secretary of labor the use of the post-offices and postal facilities to help in carrying out the measure.

Necessity Undenied. In the course of its report, the house committee on labor states: "The necessity for legislation of this character is denied by none; and, indeed, the increasing menace of the situation in regard to unemployment at certain seasons of the year is so apparent that all students of the question agree that some remedy must be found. It is also agreed that the problem cannot be handled efficiently except by an agency having a power and scope of a national bureau, since it is an interstate problem and utterly beyond the power of the individual states to cope with, although it is believed that the national bureau can co-operate with the state institutions of a like character, and the bill makes provision for such co-operation."
