FIRST NATIONAL PAID \$10,306 IN LAWSUIT

BANK'S CLAIM AGAINST B. C. DILENBECK, OF PERRY, SETTLED IN FULL.

SETTLEMENT IS MADE TO SATISFY COURT'S JUDGMENT

The Lawsuit, Which Was Tried Ten Days Ago, Had Been Appealed to Supreme Court by Dilenbeck's Attorney—Said That Dilenbeck's Father Ordered Settlement.

Probably one of the largest sums ever paid into the district court to satisfy a judgment in an action on notes, was paid to Clerk of Courts S. H. Reilly late Saturday to satisfy the court's order in the case of the First National Bank of this city, against B. C. Dilenbeck, of Perry.

Father Settles Son's Case.

The case was tried only week before last, and ended when Judge Willett took the suit away from the jury and directed a verdict for the bank.

The judgment was satisfied by C. M. Hollis, acting for S. Dilenbeck, father of B. C. Dilenbeck, the defendant. The elder Dilenbeck is a banker of Perry, and reputed to be probably the richest man in Dallas county.

Reliable, but unconfirmed information, is to the effect that the elder Dilenbeck took the settlement of the judgment into his own hands while his son was away from Perry by instructing Hollis to come here and pay the money.

Was Suit on Notes.

The suit was an action on promissory notes given by Dilenbeck to the bank. Dilenbeck alleged as a defense that the notes were given to the bank after the bank had refused longer to carry sight drafts of the A. E. Shorthill Company, on which Dilenbeck had

FLOOD NEW COUNCIL WITH MANY PETITIONS

PROPERTY OWNERS APPLY FOR SEWER AND WATER EXTENSIONS AND PAVING.

NORTHWEST PART OF CITY WANTS MANY IMPROVEMENTS

Street Department Organized by Appointment of Fred Detrick to Be Street Foreman Instead of George Herman, Street Commissioner—Detrick to Report to City Engineer.

Petitions for enough sewer and water extensions, sidewalks and some pavement, to constitute a large order for city work, were filed with the city council this forenoon.

West State street property owners living between Eighth and Ninth streets asked for a sewer, the petitioners agreeing to connect their houses with it as soon as it is in.

North Tenth street property owners want a sewer laid between State and Summit streets. Nine property owners signed it.

Property owners who are building near Fremont and Tenth streets petitioned for a sewer in Fremont between Ninth and Tenth streets.

Residents of that part of Marion street that was formerly Court street petitioned for sewer, water and pavement, and some others of the same street petitioned against the pavement.

An extension of water mains is asked for the block in Fremont street between Fourth and Fifth streets.

Six property owners of South Fifth avenue petitioned to have the block from Church to Linn street paved with concrete.

A sidewalk for Summit street from Tenth to Twelfth streets was petitioned for by property owners living in the two blocks.

The West Main street petitioners want the city to put in a sidewalk 1,750 feet long in the south side of Main street west of Thirteenth street.

People living in the vicinity of Summit and Sixth streets petitioned the council to open Summit street west of Sixth a distance of about half a block, or until it joins Summit street in Gillespie & Howard's Sunnyside addition.

CLOSES IMPORTANT WORK.

Frank Haas Sees Men He Has Been Trying to Convict Sent to Pen.

Frank Haas, a former member of the police force, now a special agent for the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, arrived in the city Saturday evening from Cedar Rapids, where Saturday afternoon nine men, on whose cases Haas has been working in company with W. J. King, another Milwaukee detective, were given their sentences in the federal court.

The exception of three of the number all the men lived at Tama. They were members of a gang that was charged with stealing \$3,500 worth of merchandise—largely men's clothing and hats, silks and whisky—from box cars.

King and Haas have been working on the case for ten weeks. The men sentenced were Milton Armstrong and "Jess" Stull, who received ten years in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan.; John, alias "Goldy" Duffy, and "Bob" Stover, who received eight years; Wilbur Davis, five years; "Tommy" Morgan, three years; and the Marion boys, while boarding a car for the purpose of robbery, and "Al" Davis, a brother of Wilbur, three years; Burr Armstrong, a brother of Milton, and George Zeigler, six months in the Tama jail.

Armstrong and Zeigler turned state's evidence and for this reason secured lighter sentences. Duffy gives his home as Rochester, N. Y.; Stover lives at Kansas City; and Morgan at Sauk Center, Minn.


