

MURDERER CONFESSES

NICK JASKOVICH ADMITS KILLING ALEXANDER KOBLASKY AT MASON CITY.

CRIME RESULT OF QUARREL OVER MONEY

Mayer Alleges Koblasky Refused to Return \$100 Advanced to Pay Fine Assessed For Bootlegging - Shoots Koblasky as He Sleeps - Jaskovich First to Report Murder.

Mason City, April 26.—Upon his own confession made to police and county officers at 7 o'clock last night, Nick Jaskovich was arrested for the murder of Alexander Koblasky which occurred at 5 o'clock yesterday morning.

With a bullet hole in the left side of his forehead just below the hair, Alexander Koblasky, an employe at the Minneapolis and St. Paul roundhouse, was found dead in his bed by officers who went to investigate the case just before 6 o'clock Sunday morning.

As result of the investigation of the officers, all of the men in the Koblasky rooming house, and the Stephens Kelly, a Russian rooming house next door, were taken to the court house and held for investigation. All day yesterday the police and county officers worked in an effort to get from some of the twenty-seven men arrested a clue as to the person who committed the crime.

Coroner Long removed the body of the dead man to the McAuley morgue where an autopsy was held at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. This morning the bullet had taken a backward and downward course from where it entered the head. Powder marks, plainly visible on the wound, showed the shot had been fired at close range.

Jaskovich paid a fine of \$100 for Koblasky on June 6, 1914. Koblasky was convicted of bootlegging. The murderer had said he had \$100 of the \$100. Saturday night he asked Koblasky for the rest of the money and he was told he had no receipt and could not collect the money in any way. "Your money is lost," Koblasky is alleged to have said Saturday night, whereupon Jaskovich replied that his money was lost, Koblasky was shot.

After his arrest, Jaskovich showed the officers where he had buried the gun with which the man was shot in a pile of manure near a little grocery store about a block from the house.

STATE TO SHOW GOOD GAIN.

Early Census Figures Indicate Substantial Increase in Population. Special to Times-Republican. Des Moines, April 26.—Tomorrow, A. U. A large amount of the census work has been returned. No statistics of any kind have been given out from the bureau, nor will there be for a long time. The reports indicate, however, that the state is to show a very respectable increase in population, practically all of it being the increase in urban population.

Night Watchman Shot. Des Moines, April 26.—Clarence Hoskins, 37 years old, employed as night watchman at the Liberty Company, was shot in a revolver duel at 4:30 o'clock yesterday morning with two unknown men at the plant. He was shot twice in the left leg and is now in the Iowa Lutheran hospital. His wounds are not regarded as serious. Young Hoskins was sleeping in the building when the two men rapped at the door and sought admittance, which was refused them. As Hoskins started to reach for his revolver, one

FARMER KILLS WIFE

WEALTHY RESIDENT, OF DES MOINES COUNTY SLAYS WOMAN AN DURING QUARREL.

CLAIMS SELF DEFENSE IN HIS CONFESSION

Says Woman Attacked Him With Butcher Knife After Calling Him Thief—Climax of Domestic Troubles Covering Period of Years—Disagreements Over Financial Matters.

Davenport, April 26.—"I've killed her!" said Charles Ruebling, farmer of Rockingham township, Saturday afternoon as he waved his son, George, in from the field. In a bloody and huddled heap, in a half sitting posture, was the butchered body of his wife, the wind-pipe completely severed, a gash thru the cheek, the left ear partly severed and other gashes on the face.

NEW LAWS IN EFFECT

Several Important Measures Passed by Legislature in Force Now by Publication—Blue Sky Law to Become Effective This Week.

Des Moines, April 26.—W. S. Allen, secretary of state, is finishing up the publication of acts of the Thirty-sixth general assembly which were directed to become effective at once. Most of the laws to which a publication clause was attached were legalizing acts. Many of these were directed to be published without expense to the state. But as the secretary of state has not been informed who is to pay for the publication, action has been delayed in a few cases.

The important laws which have gone into effect by publication so far are: Allen "red light" injunction act. Authorizing employment of state auditors. Board of trustees for drainage districts. Providing for relocation of tracks. Giving cities power to establish paving districts. Providing expenses for judges and reporters.

Permitting Davenport and Dubuque to retail saloons until Jan. 1, 1916. Creating board of audit. Permitting cities to regulate jitney buses. Providing sewer system and sheep barn at fair grounds. Fixing duties of supreme court reporter and code editor. Permitting use of convicts on public work.

The appropriation bills went into effect on publication also. The act directed, however, that many of the appropriations shall not be available until July 1. The Thomas blue sky law will go into effect this week. It is probable that it will be in force by Tuesday morning.

The laws revising the salaries of county sheriffs, treasurers and auditors will go into effect until July 1. Three hundred officials are affected by the laws. Many of them are granted an increase in salary by the act and they are anxious about the time the measures become effective.

FIRE LOSS AT MASON CITY.

Three Business Firms and Building Owners Meet Total Loss of \$15,000. Special to Times-Republican. Mason City, April 26.—A \$15,000 fire occurred here this morning. The fire originated in the Ben Clark bakery, owned by J. B. Youngblood. Damage to the building is \$5,000 and to the stock \$2,000. Other losses were: Christensen grocery building, owned by O. R. Patton, stock damage \$3,000, building \$1,000; Misses Snider & Buchanan, millinery building, owned by J. H. Snider, stock damage \$2,000, building \$2,000.
