

WILSON AND BRYAN PUT VILLA IN DISCARD

ADMINISTRATION FORSAKES FORMER MEXICAN LEADER AND GOES OVER TO CARRANZA.

FRIEND OF BRYAN MAKES REPORT FROM "FRONT"

Richard L. Metcalfe Describes Carranza as Honest, Constructive Leader - Washington Plans Hope of Pacification of Mexico on Man Who Now Appears to Be at Head of Dominant Faction--Favors Prohibition.

Washington, April 28.—The administration has turned apparently to Carranza as its hope for the pacification of Mexico, Villa, the former hope of the administration, having been defeated, has been thrown into the discard.

"Any unbiased judge of character would say that so far as concerns peace and constructive government in Mexico Carranza is the hope," declared Richard L. Metcalfe, of Omaha, Neb., former Panama canal zone governor, who has returned from Vera Cruz.

Mr. Metcalfe is a close personal and business friend of Secretary Bryan, having been associated with him on the Commoner. He was Mr. Bryan's early choice for a position on the zone commission. Mr. Metcalfe was not sent on any special mission to Vera Cruz, but he made his investigations as a friend of Secretary Bryan and of the administration. His views, therefore, have semi-official significance.

A Revolution of Ideas. "The revolution in Mexico," he says, "so far as Mr. Carranza and his followers are concerned, is not only a revolution of arms but it is a revolution of ideas. In Villa territory one hears everything of military supremacy. In Carranza territory one hears suggestions concerning constructive civil government."

"When Villa captures or abandons a town, military tactics is the dominant thought. When Obregon, Carranza's military leader, captures a town and leaves it, Carranza follows his military chieftain and establishes civil government."

"Some idea of the dominant thought of the 'first chief' may be obtained in the fact that he has issued a book for the use of the school children of Mexico, which book is entitled 'Ten Notable Citizens.'"

"Carranza is not a senile old man, as one writer has described him. I think he is just a bit stubborn, but it is generally admitted in Mexico that he is an honest man, and I am sure that any unbiased judge of character would say that so far as concerns peace and constructive government in Mexico, Carranza is the hope."

"I was somewhat surprised to learn that the question of prohibition is foremost in the thoughts of many Carranza leaders, even as it is among the leaders of Russia and England. They have in Mexico a drink called pulque, which is somewhat similar to the Russian drink called vodka. I sat at luncheon with a Carranza leader and he talked strongly on the importance of sooner or later abolishing strong drink in Mexico."

"Carranza is not an enemy of the United States. He is an ardent admirer of our institutions. He understands thoroughly the line of demarcation between the schools of Alexander Hamilton and Thomas Jefferson. The Americans who hold high place in Car-

ranza's heart are Thomas Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln. "Mexico is a wonderful country, but it is in a deplorable state today. I believe Carranza will lead his people out of the wilderness."

DES MOINES CENSUS OVER 100,000.

Count of Noses Expected to Total 105,000--Citizens Jubilant. Des Moines, April 28.—At precisely 2:30 o'clock yesterday many locomotives of Des Moines the fact that they had begun residence in a city of 100,000 population.
