

IMPROVED WEATHER WEAKENS VALUES

PROSPECTS OF BETTER CONDITIONS IN CROP BELTS GIVE WHEAT BEARS ADVANTAGE.

PRICES OPEN LOWER AND DECLINE ALL AROUND

Corn Recedes With Wheat and Because of Improved Field Conditions—Tradition in Oats Take Cue From Other Cereals—Provisions About Steady, Market Following Hog Quotations.

Chicago, May 29.—Prospects for better weather gave the bears an advantage today in the wheat market here. Lower quotations from Liverpool tended also to favor the buying side. In addition, the fact that high premiums for May delivery would end today acted as a handicap to the bulls. Opening prices, which ranged from 1/4 to 1 1/2 lower, were followed by material declines all around.

Absence of export call resulted later in a more pronounced setback. Offerings of May, however, were scarce near the end of the session, and there was a sharp rally in that option. The market closed unsettled at 1/4 to 1/2 under last night.

Corn. Corn receded with wheat. Indications of improved field conditions counted farther to wear prices off. The market after opening 1/4 down to a shade advance, underwent a moderate general sag.

No reaction ensued until near the close. Prices finished easy at 1/4 to 1/2 net decline.

Oats. Traders in oats took their cue from other cereals. There was a fair volume of business.

Provisions. Provisions held about steady. What action there was in prices appeared to depend chiefly on the course of the hog market.

Chicago, May 29.—Wheat—The finish of May wheat was rather tame and liquidation in this delivery affected prices of the deferred months. There was a little hedging in July of Texas new crop wheat and considerable selling by local traders on the prospects of more favorable weather. While the forecast is for settled weather, undoubtedly considerable damage has been done by high water in large sections of the southwest and in parts of Iowa and Illinois. Trading today was restricted by the double holiday and the unwillingness of operators to carry open trading over Sunday and Monday. The visible supply for the week is likely to show little change. Cash demand was slow and news from abroad was not calculated to create confidence in the shipping situation. The foreign situation and weather conditions for ripening and harvesting of the new crop will be the important factors in the immediate future.

Corn—Little change occurred in the prices for corn, although the market ruled easier in sympathy with wheat and the belief that weather conditions would be more favorable next week. Heavy rains fell over night and many points in the corn belt reported further rain this morning. Buying by commission houses on resting orders and by cash houses checked the declining tendency of the market. A good sized increase is expected in the visible supply and the prospect is for a light movement in June.

Oats—Liquidation in May oats resulted in a decline of 1/4 cents in that delivery while July lost 1/4 cent and September was practically unchanged from last night. Oats to arrive were in good demand, standard selling at 1 1/2 cents over May. The visible supply (1,500,000) the seaboard reported a fair demand and local cash houses sold 900 bushels. Domestic sales of 300,000 bushels were reported. Weather conditions while favorable for the growing crop, will probably result in some delay to harvest.

Provisions—Provisions ruled higher on covering by shorts, some of which was attributed to the larger packers. Reports of liberal sales for export, particularly of lard had much to do with today's advance. Bad roads and delayed farm work are likely to result in a reduced movement of hogs.

HOGS HOLD STEADY AT LATE DECLINE

PART OF FRIDAY'S LOSS RECOVERED AND BEST SELL UP TO \$7.80.

RECEIPTS RUN HEAVIER THAN SAME TIME LAST YEAR

Cattle Market Weak as Trading Closes—Light and Medium Steers Selling Lower and Discriminated Against—Others Hold Recent Gains—Sheep and Lambs Decline.

Chicago, May 29.—Hogs held steady today on the basis of Friday's closing prices, which advanced from the low spot of the day.

During the first five days of the week there have been about 129,400 hogs received at Chicago, being 1,500 less than same days last week, 5,000 more than a year ago and 13,000 more than corresponding period two years ago. There were 1,722 hogs carried over from Thursday. Armour had about 1,400 in direct from another market.

Eleven markets received 79,900 hogs Friday or 7,200 more than last Friday, 8,400 more than a year ago and 15,000 more than two years ago. Total thus far this week 453,000, or 45,000 less than same period last year, 2,000 less than like time last year and 3,000 less than corresponding five days two years ago. Total for 1915 to date 11,730,000, or 1,720,000 more than same period 1914 and 14,100,000 more than corresponding time 1913.

Cattle. Cattle trade was weak and there was small trading, arrivals being of the usual small Saturday quota.

The prime yearlings, both steers and heifers, have been in a 35c decline in recent days. The trade has had a lot of stuff, especially medium to pretty good kind, supply overrunning demand requirements, and killers, claiming to have much more of this class of beef than they can sell, have used this argument to severely break the market.

A shorter movement of yearlings will be required next week, and good policy warrants the country in holding these back, for the choice to prime yearlings demand is almost sure to revive.

There was no beef loaded this week from River Platte ports for American points. This was the first week in four that no meat was sent from that country. Last week there was a total of 39,000 quarters loaded for this country.

There were only a few cars of all kinds of live stock in the free area Friday. This week the proportion in the latter division has been quite large and about the largest run since the establishment of the dead market was on hand this week. Shippers were good buyers of cattle, and while the receipts show a decrease for the five days, shipments for the same period are larger than last week.

Next Monday the local killing beds will be idle in observance of Decoration day holiday. The market will be open as usual, but in view of the idle killing gangs that day, it is obvious that a light Monday run will suffice to fill the demands. The trade is pulling for a supply of 15,000 or less, feeling that receipts must be kept down to avoid a sharp recession in prices.
