

SLATTERY DEFEATS MASON CITY TWICE

PITCHES ANSONS TO VICTORY IN BOTH GAMES OF SUNDAY DOUBLE HEADER.

RELIEVED IN LAST INNING OF SECOND GAME

Retires After Going Seventeen Innings, Giving Way to Beard—Star Left-Hander Freely Hit But Is Effective in Pinches—Ansons Held to Single Safe Hit in Saturday's Game.

Mason City, June 28.—Seventeen innings of Slattery was too much for the Claydiggers Sunday and they dropped both contests of the double header to the visiting Ansons. The second game was not such a walk away as the first but both were easy victories. Mason City swatters whacked the Anson pitcher for several safe singles in each game but Slattery absolutely refused to allow hits to be made when men were on bases.

Bunching their hits, and errors by the local team, allowed the Marshalltown aggregation to pile up a good lead in the first game and inability to get over the bases in the second was responsible for a close defeat. The Anson star moundman almost finished both contests but in the last half of the ninth of the last game he called for time and asked Manager Richards to send in another twirler. Two safe blows had been registered by the first two men up when the pitcher asked to be relieved. Beard was sent to the rescue and closed the game but not before one of the two men on when he took command had scored.

Ansons Score in First. The Ansons scored in the first inning of the initial contest. After two men had gone down on infield outs, Richards swatted a two sacker deep into left center. Ashby then spanked one to right and Richards scored while Miller was throwing to the diamond. Glaser got the throw in and retired Ashby at second base to close the stanza. The Claydiggers also scored in the initial inning. Brausen came up first and swatted a two base drive over the third junction. Bay sacrificed him to second and he scored when Hammerschmidt fell down in an attempt to get a wild pitch by Slattery. Lowther was walked and died piffing second and Vinson fled out to center to close the inning.

The Ansons again chalked one on the score board in the fourth stanza. Ryan swatted the third two sacker of the day and advanced to third when Richards flew out to Bay. Ashby hit one into Glaser's mit and the pitcher held it as long as he could and still make the out at first, but Ryan was two feet for the fielders and made the plate on the out. Martini singled to left but was caught trying to stretch to a double.

Score Four in Sixth. In the sixth stanza the visitors not only put the game on ice, but apparently locked the ice box with four rallies. Slattery started the fracas by getting on thru Hardy's miff. Boyd was thrown out by the pitcher but Ryan singled and an error by Lowther let Richards on and permitted Slattery to count. Ashby flew out to right and then Martini swatted for two sacks to score Ryan. Buergein singled and Martini made the plate. The new right fielder next stole second and when DeLongy hit to center he attempted to score but was thrown out at the plate, to close the inning. After that the visitors did not seem to desire to get further than the first sack.

Claydiggers Add Two Runs. Mason City made two other two scores in the last of the seventh. A three bar whollup by Vinson opened the affair and, after Miller and Sohn had both fled out, Hardy scratched a single over third which scored Vinson. A two sacker by Smith scored Sohn and the catcher tried to score from second on a long single by Glaser but cut the third sack, making the third out. The score:

In the second game Fitzpatrick took the mound for the Claydiggers and at first the Ansons had some trouble in finding him but in the fourth they got to him for two doubles and three scores. Richards, who was the first man up in the inning, swatted the initial two sacker when he lined one deep into left center. He advanced another sack when Ashby was thrown out by Hardy at first. He scored when Smith dropped Hardy's peg of Martini's swat. Buergein next whacked one into left center and went to third while Martini scored, when Bay whipped the ball wide of the plate and into the home bench. Buergein scored when DeLongy fled out a sacrifice to left.

In the last of the fourth frame Mason City made their first tally. Ashby went out to Richards, unassisted,

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RICHARDS RESIGNS AS ANSON MANAGER

TO BE SUCCEEDED BY NEW PILOT BEFORE TEAM COMES FROM SOUTHERN TRIP.

DIRECTORS CONSIDER THREE MEN FOR PLACE. Likely New Leader Will Come With Team For Next Home Series—Directors Take Time to Obtain Best Man Available—Three-1, Former W-I and Kitty League Pilots Apply.

The directors of the Marshalltown Baseball Association have received the resignation of Manager Frank Richards, and it is likely that a new pilot for the Ansons will take charge of the team within a week.

Expect Answer Thursday. A definite answer from the man who is considered first choice is expected not later than Thursday. Business considerations have caused postponement of a final answer but the directors have been notified that it may be expected shortly. It is thought best to delay the final choice until that time, as neither of the three men considered would be able to take up the managerial duties for several days.

Richards' Resignation Voluntary. Richards' resignation was voluntary, and in notifying the directors that he desired a release from the burden of directing the affairs of the club, he stated that he had done all that he could to give the town a good team and believed that the task should be handed over to someone else.

Quiet Search for Manager. The board of directors has been investigating several prospective managers but has been inclined to give this action as little publicity as possible owing to the possible effect it might have on the team and to leave
