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**AUTOS IN COLLISION.**  
Passenger Hurt and Two Cars Damaged in Wreck.  
What might have been a serious accident happened about 11 o'clock this morning when an auto belonging to W. T. Smith of this city, and driven by F. J. Whitacre, collided with an auto driven by Fred Gould, of Gilman, at a turn in the road in Albion. In the auto with Whitacre was his son Dean, aged 7, and Whitacre's sister, Mrs. C. G.
