

PARTY MISSIONARY OUT

REPUBLICAN LEADER VISITS IOWA TO CONFER WITH CUMMINS AND OTHERS.

SEEKING TO REUNITE G. O. P. MEMBERSHIP

Hon. Edward Randolph Wood Undertakes Task of Lining Up Entire Party For Republican Principles of Real Protection—Pocahontas Officials Appeal Lake Drainage Case.

Des Moines, Aug. 7.—Hon. Edward Randolph Wood, of Philadelphia, a republican leader in his state, was in Des Moines yesterday interviewing Governor Clarke, Senator Cummins and other leaders here. He is on his way to Salt Lake City to visit Senator Reed Smoot. He has been visiting Mayor T. A. Potter, of Mason City.

Mr. Wood's one particular mission at this time is the reuniting of the republican party. He says he believes that before the early spring months this will be accomplished and that voters will go to the polls in November, 1916, determined to elect a republican who will restore republican tariff principles. He says the east is feeling the need of a protective tariff more keenly and if it were not for the war the ill effects of free trade would be far more apparent to the nation at large. As it is many eastern industries are suffering. The republican party cannot longer afford to be divided, he says, and he believes where there are two hands in bringing the two factions together. He says there are a number of available candidates for president who would give the country a business administration such as will be so essential after the war.

Pocahontas county officials have appealed to the supreme court their case against the state executive council growing out of the sale of the lake beds of Swan lake and Rut lake. The county is claiming that the \$20,000 received from the sale of these lake beds by the state belongs to Pocahontas county. The case was brought in the Polk county district court and Governor Clarke and other members of the executive council were made defendants. John Forbes, treasurer of Pocahontas county, asked the state to set aside the damns be issued directing the executive council to pay this sum over to their county. On motion filed by John Fletcher of the attorney general's office the case was dismissed. It is now being appealed and may come up next month. The state has refused to pay because of the uncertainty of the title to the lake bed and state officials say that when this claim can be determined the matter will be adjudicated accordingly.

The supreme court is being asked to pass on the validity of the new city ordinance regulating jitney buses. Attorney A. D. Pugh appeared before Justice Gaynor yesterday and argued for a temporary injunction restraining the city from enforcing the ordinance which otherwise will go into effect tonight. Justice Gaynor will probably rule on this point today. Jitney bus operators are fighting the ordinance and none of them has as yet taken out license, altho Superintendent Mitchell, of the public department has notified them that all who are operating without a license under the new ordinance Sunday will be arrested. The council met yesterday morning expecting to pass upon the applications for licenses, but none had been presented. All the jitney operators are thus far standing pat.

An appeal has been perfected in the William Sayles case, in which Sayles was found guilty of the murder of John G. Runyan at Council Bluffs. Runyan died as the result of an assault by Sayles, according to the verdict of the court at Council Bluffs, and Sayles was found guilty of second degree murder. The assault took place on May 7, 1914, and the trial of Sayles ended October 16. The court overruled a motion for a new trial and the case has been appealed to the supreme court and will probably be heard next month.

IS PERRIN HIDING?

SOME MYSTERY IS CONNECTED WITH DEPARTURE OF TELLER OF ROBBED BANK.

SEEKING TO ESCAPE ANNOYANCE BY SLEUTHS

Perrin's Friends Said to Be Indignant at Manner of Detectives in Continually Questioning Bank Employee Who Was Robbed of \$21,000—Police Think Robber Non-Resident.

Cedar Rapids, Aug. 7.—Has Leo Perrin left the city in order to avoid being further annoyed by the detectives? An affirmative report to this query was given in the city Friday, but it was not corroborated at his home or at the bank. Mrs. Perrin, who has been much distressed and annoyed by the continued demands for Mr. Perrin, refused to state anything concerning him, or his whereabouts. She referred all questions to the bank.

Cashier Kent C. Forman said that he did not know where Mr. Perrin was spending the day. "I have not seen him all day," he said. Some of the friends of Perrin, however, advanced a theory for his disappearance. They said he had probably gone away to avoid further annoyance by the string of detectives, professional and amateur who are here working on the case. They stated that he had been advised Friday to tell the detectives to go to. They advised him to say to the detectives:

"Gentlemen—I have told my story not once, but several times. There is nothing more for me to tell you and I do not care to be hounded by you any longer."

Whether Mr. Perrin did this cannot be told with accuracy. But it was reported at the Union station that Perrin left for Chicago during Thursday night.

Visit to Rogue's Gallery.

One report had it that he had been called into Chicago to look over a series of photographs in possession of one of the detective agencies to see if he could pick out the photograph of the robber in the bank Wednesday morning. Many of Mr. Perrin's friends complained about the method of the private detectives who shadowed Mr. Perrin and pestered him with questions. Mr. Perrin's friends advised him to inform the detectives that he told them all about the robbery and that he is too much of a man of character to submit to foolish questions made by the sleuths who are fond of the third degree method. Mr. Perrin answered all questions asked and was very patient with the detectives. Some of the sleuths, however, found themselves unable to find a clue. They did not know enough to examine the building and find the empty rooms on the second floor and the stairway in the alley. All they did was to shadow Mr. Perrin and annoy him with foolish questions. There was a general good feeling in the city. They had after the talks got to work on the case.

Sleuths Are Legion.

Cedar Rapids continues to be the mecca of sleuths of the Bureau agency, Pinkerton agency and other agencies here in the city. There were many confabulations at the police station and at the hotels. All indications were that the sleuths realize the importance of the job and will exert every effort to get the story which will come to the one who gets the clue which might result in arrest.

Attorney General Cossom's men are equally busy. James Branson, who was the first man sent out from Des Moines on the case Friday, is still being worked on by the police. Branson, former deputy sheriff, but now one of Cossom's men, remained on the job here. Detective William F. Patterson, former Cedar Rapids detective and later identified with Mr. Risdon in the Central detective agency, also is reported to be working for Cossom.

Some Investigations.

It was said that several city characters were interviewed at the police station. Chief Burgin declared that two men had been interviewed. He stated, however, that the bank robbery was a job by a professional bandit from another city and that it is his opinion that giving the third degree to police court characters and petty thieves is useless.

AMES COLLEGE FAME EXTENDING

Exhibit at Frisco Exposition Brings Inquiries From Foreigners.

Pearson that the college would receive a special award in recognition of its part in the exhibit on agricultural education, for which a special gold medal has just been awarded by the exposition authorities.
