ENROLLMENT 2,667 Increase of 187 Pupils Shown in Public Schools From Opening Day Monday—To Divide First Grade Classes For Month.

An increase of 187 pupils in the public schools of the city, including the high school, was shown on this, the third day of school, over the opening day Monday.

All of the ward buildings have shown increases over the opening day, and a further increase is looked for by the first of next week. The figures by wards follow:

LIGHTS FOR WEST MAIN

Movement Started by Marshalltown Club and Property Owners to Extend Electrolite Lighting to Thirteenth.

A plan proposed for lighting West Main street from Thirteenth to Thirteenth street with electrolite lamps was approved Tuesday night by the parks and boulevards committee of the Marshalltown Club.

The Iowa Railway and Light Company will erect new and permanent steel trolley poles on Main street from Thirteenth to Thirteenth. It is proposed to attach an iron bracket, carrying one sixty watt lamp and globe to each of these poles at a height to line up with the electrolite lights in the business section.

The public utilities company has agreed to furnish the poles and set them, and to furnish the brackets, lamps, globes and wire, and install the lamps at practically cost.

The Iowa Railway and Light Company has planned the street to place seventy-four of the poles at distances ranging from 80 to 128 feet apart, and spaced so that there would be two lights at each street and alley intersection.

A committee composed of James L. Denmead, Charles Munson, Dr. H. C. Mueller, H. J. Rodgers and W. F. Estel was appointed to lay the plan before the city council for its approval.



EXTENSION AND IMPROVEMENTS IN 1915:

Steel Tower Transmission Lines. Tama to Blairtown 28.6 miles. Perry to Jefferson 22.5 miles. Cedar Rapids to Shellsburg 12.5 miles.

Transmission Lines: Blairtown to Marengo 8 miles. Nevada to Colo 8 miles. Gladbrook to Reinbeck 19 miles. LeGrand to Gilman 12.5 miles. North Liberty to Oxford 12 miles. Total transmission lines being constructed 124.1 miles.

Distribution systems are to be constructed in the following towns: Colo, Dana, Gilman, Luzerne, Oxford, Rippey and Shellsburg. Distribution system at Grand Junction is being reconstructed.


