

EAST TAKES NOTICE OF CUMMINS BOOM

SURPRISED AT STRENGTH OF SENATOR AS PRESIDENTIAL POSSIBILITY.

ALWAYS MENTIONED AS ONE TO BE RECKONED WITH

Utah Politician Places Iowa Man as Among Three of Candidates Meant in Favor Among Voters—Root Not Likely to Be Nominated—War Affects Politics.

[Special Correspondence.]
Washington, Sept. 9.—Since word came from Iowa recently that the Iowa republicans had settled on definite plans to promote the candidacy of Senator Cummins for president, with State Chairman Rawson in charge of the movement, eastern republican political leaders have been sitting up and taking more notice of the support of Senator Cummins than heretofore.

Some of the old guard eastern papers have hitherto refused to give the Cummins movement the consideration it deserved. Evidently they had the notion they would be able to stop it by ignoring it. But that day has passed. In no articles treating the republican presidential situation with any breadth and seriousness does Senator Cummins fail to get mention.

Moreover, some of the eastern papers have been looking over the ground thru special representatives lately. Reports are being sent back that Cummins will not only have his own state but that he has much support in the Dakotas, Nebraska, Minnesota, Illinois, and in various other western states.

Strength Is Recognized.

Governor Spry, of Utah, who passed thru Washington on his way from the conference of governors at Boston, went so far as to say that Root, Weeks and Cummins were the three foremost possibilities. He thinks Cummins has a great deal of western support. While comparatively few progressive republicans would be willing to tolerate the nomination of Root and while there is little reason to believe Root is going to get the nomination, Governor Spry's statement is interesting as revealing a growing disposition

to recognize in states remote from Iowa that Senator Cummins is a factor to be considered.
It seems to be a certainty now that Senator Cummins will go into the convention with enough enthusiastic support to make him a leading figure from the first.
All astute politicians here realize that unless the international sky clears sufficiently so the people can devote attention to domestic issues, it will be difficult to get proper consideration given either to the republican nomination or to the 1916 campaign. Senator Cummins will stand a much better show of nomination if, as the time comes for the convention, the public attention is centered on such domestic problems as the railroad problem, revenue, tariff, finance, and the like. Circumstances may arise in the international situation which will practically assure Wilson's re-election.

TO BUILD \$20,000 SYNAGOGUE.

Oskaloosa Jews Form Incorporation to Erect Building.

Oskaloosa, Sept. 9.—The Jews of Oskaloosa at a meeting held Tuesday evening, decided on plans for the erection of a \$20,000 synagogogue in this city. The work of forming a corporation has been started and it is thought work on the building will begin this fall.

Ames Prepares to Pave.

Ames, Sept. 9.—Final action on the resolution of necessity for paving was taken by the city council at the meeting Monday night. After amending the resolution by not including some of the outlying streets as originally proposed the vote was unanimously in favor of the proposition. The city engineer will now prepare plans and specifications for the four different kinds of paving as provided for in the resolution and advertise for bids. The council will consider the bids submitted before deciding what kind of paving shall be used. The four different kinds of material specified in the resolution, included bituminous, asphaltic concrete, vitrified brick blocks and creosote wood blocks.
