

# FAIR HORSE RACES DRAW MANY ENTRIES

TIME OF MAKING ENTRY ENDS  
AND FINDS ALL EVENTS OF  
PROGRAM FILLED.

CLASS IS AS GOOD AS  
ANY PREVIOUS FAIR

All the races, including the Regular \$400 Purse Events, as well as the Special \$250 Trot for 3-Year-Olds, Filled—Nearly All Well Represented—List of Entries by Events.

Entries for the harness races of the Marshall county fair, Sept. 13 to 17, closed Wednesday night. All of the races, including the eight regular events for \$400 purses and the special for colts for a purse of \$250, have been filled. The entries number eighty-eight, and all of the races filled well with the possible exception of the trotting events for the 3-year-olds. It has but five entries.

The entries are not as numerous as they were for the races of last year's fair, but all classes on the program are well represented. Even the faster events, such as the 2:15 pace and the 2:15 trot, have large fields entered, the pace twelve and the trot eight. There are eight entries in the 2:30 pace, ten in the 2:12 pace, twelve in the 2:12 trot, eleven in the 2:15 trot, ten in the 2:15 trot, twelve in the 2:30 trot, and in the others as mentioned.

DEATH AT STATE CENTER.  
"Christ" Niedert, Well-Known Citizen, Dies After Long Illness.

After having suffered two years from an intestinal cancer "Christ" Niedert, a well-known resident of State Center, and for many years a farmer northwest of that town, died this morning at 4:50 at his home. Mr. Niedert was taken ill in August, 1912, and with the exception of short intervals when he has been able to be about, has been confined to his home.

Henry Christian Niedert was a native of Hessen, Germany, where he was born Oct. 2, 1844. He came to this country at the age of 4 with his parents, who settled in Illinois, where young Niedert was reared. In Kendall county, Illinois, April 5, 1866, Mr. Niedert was united in marriage with Miss Mary Pope. In 1870 Mr. and Mrs. Niedert came to this county and settled on a farm five miles northwest of State Center, where they lived until they moved into State Center in February, 1906.

Of the fifteen children born to Mr. and Mrs. Niedert eleven survive their father in addition to the widow. The children are Mrs. George Bader, two and one-half miles north of State Center; Mrs. Louis Harwig, six miles northwest of State Center; Fred Henry, Harvey and Glenn Niedert, of Canastota, S. D.; William Niedert and Mrs. Earl Roberts of State Center; Mrs. Theodore Latch of Galeston, Colo.; Thomas of Riceville; and George of Colo.

The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at 1:30 from the house, and at 2 o'clock from the Presbyterian church, Rev. E. B. Whitney officiating. Burial will be in Hillside cemetery.
