GOOD PROPERTY ACTIVE.

Sale of High Priced Residences and Lots Feature of Market.

High priced residence property and valuable building sites in vacant lots, both close in and outlying, were most active in the dealings of the local market for the week ending Monday.

Second ward property was dealt in almost to the exclusion of realty in other parts of the city. With the exception of three transactions all the sales were in the second ward. Of interest to the realty market was the filing of the plat for Binford Park addition, that was approved recently by the council.

There were no sales of farms made of record, and little trading in property in the small towns of the county. The total business for the week was \$39,580, compared with \$23,962 last week, and \$21,920 for the corresponding week of August and \$35,790 for the same week of July.

The transactions in small town property totaled \$1,169. Not the least part of the amount involved, the purchase back of the former Denmead home, 405 West Main street, a transaction that was negotiated earlier in the summer by Dwight H. Denmead from Mrs. Rachel Ely.

Was the largest property sale of the week. The price was \$17,400, which included an \$8,000 mortgage that the purchaser assumed.

One of the most interesting transactions of the week outside of the second ward was the sale by N. P. Miller of his residence property at 410 West Boone street to J. G. Snyder for \$3,500. The property is a lot 60x28 feet, improved with a good house. Mr. and Mrs. Miller, who are living at 210 South Fourth avenue at present, will soon move to the Laffer flat, 106 North Fourth street.
