## D. E. HOLE DIES AT ALAMEDA, SASK.

END COMES SUDDENLY TO WELL-KNOWN RESIDENT OF THIS CITY.

IN USUAL HEALTH WHEN HE LEFT HOME TUESDAY

Telegram to Wife, Received Thursday Evening, Announces Death at 6 O'clock—Had Lived in County Most of Time Since 1864—Sketch of Career.

Marshalltown lost one of her best citizens, and Marshall county one of its well-known older residents, when D. Emmet Hole, 412 North Fourth street, died suddenly at 6 o'clock Thursday evening at Alameda, Sask. News of her husband's death came in a telegram to Mrs. Hole, received at 7 o'clock Thursday. The message proved a terrible shock to the wife, who, with her two children, the daughter, and her mother, were at the time in the city. Mr. Hole had left home apparently in his usual health Tuesday night, excepting that he had a slight cold, and a card received Thursday by his wife, dated at St. Paul, said that he expected to reach Alameda at noon Thursday.

The message did not give any cause of death and efforts of the T.-R. to ascertain the cause by wire from Alameda proved fruitless. Mr. Hole had gone to Canada to look after threshing operations on his Saskatchewan farm. He was expected to be gone three or four weeks. Was Man of Many Friends. Mr. Hole's death will be learned with deep regret throughout the city and county, where he was widely known, and where he had many friends. He was greatly respected by all.

David Emmet Hole was a native of Columbiana county, Ohio, that celebrated section of the Buckeye state, which has furnished so many sturdy citizens of this part of Iowa. Mr. Hole was born at Carmel, March 2, 1849, the youngest son of Jesse and Susanna Heacock Hole. "Uncle" Jesse Hole, as he was familiarly known by his friends in the county, moved west in 1844, arriving in Marshalltown with his family on April 14. The family was bound for the Quaker settlement of Hartland, in Marietta township, where the elder Hole purchased a farm that his son Emmet owned at the time of his death. Emmet Hole was reared to manhood in the Hartland neighborhood, and remained at home until 1878. He then went west to Walla Walla, Wash., where for three years he was engaged in farming, and then in the lumber business. He returned to this county after a year of absence, and bought his father's farm, and went to housekeeping with his bride, whom he had married at Lisbon, O., Sept. 14, 1886. Mrs. Hole was Miss Mary Raley prior to her marriage. Mr. and Mrs. Hole continued to live on the Hartland farm until they moved to this city in September, 1908.

Mr. Hole is survived by his wife and two daughters. The latter are Mrs. Ralph W. Van Horn and Miss Jessie Hole, both of this city. One sister, Miss Lou H. Hole, also of this city, is living. Two brothers, Osborne Howell and Jonathan L. Hole, are dead, as are also two sisters, Mrs. Leona Wheeler, of Marietta, and Mrs. Adeline Selting, of Walla Walla, Wash. The two sisters died several years ago. J. L. Hole passed away Sept. 17, 1901, and O. H. Hole on Feb. 9, 1905. Although a birthright member of the Friends church, Mr. Hole was affiliated with the Church of Christ at the time of his death, having joined Central church after his removal to this city.

To Bring Body Here. The news of Mr. Hole's death came from a friend, Jasper Kenton, of Alameda, with whom Mr. Hole always stopped while at his farm, a few miles out of Alameda. A second telegram from Mr. Kenton said that an undertaker would leave Portal, which is on the international boundary, at 10 o'clock Friday night, for Minneapolis. Ralph W. Van Horn, Mr. Hole's son-in-law, will leave tonight for Minneapolis to take charge of the body and accompany it to this city. He expects to reach here early Sunday morning. No arrangements for the funeral have been made.
