ASKS RECEIVER FOR STORE.

J. H. Snyder Petitions Court in Action

Against W. R. Short.

To procure a settlement of his al-

leged partnership interest in the Pil-

grim drug store J. H. Snyder, a former

owner, has petitioned the district court

to appoint a receiver for the store. The

action was begun against William R.

Short, Snyder's partner and manager

of the store. The petition alleges that

partnership was formed Aug. 15, 1914,

and that a part of the agreement was

that Short was to keep detailed and

accurate book accounts. Snyder alleges

he can not check up Short, and the

partnership agreement terminated Aug.

15, but he can not get possession be-

cause Short holds the store under the

guise of exercising an option for its

purchase.

The court is asked to appoint a re-

ceiver to take possession of the store.

Judge Cummings set the hearing on

the application for 9 o'clock Saturday

forenoon.
