FIRE LOSSES ARE LESS

DECREASE OF NEARLY A HALF MILLION DOLLARS COMPARED TO PREVIOUS YEAR.

WET WEATHER FACTOR IN PREVENTING DAMAGE

People Being Educated to Exercise Precautions—United States Lags Far Behind Countries of Old World in Reducing Fire Hazards—One State Enforces Penalty For Negligence.

Special to Times-Republican. Des Moines, Oct. 2.—Losses from fire in Iowa this year, up to Sept. 1, were almost half a million less than they were in the corresponding period a year ago. The figures total \$472,301 below those for the first eight months of 1914.

Several factors have operated to bring about this saving, in the opinion of the state fire marshal's office. Of course it must be recognized that the wet weather this year as compared to the dry weather a year ago has entered into it. Another big factor is the fact that people are being educated up to being more careful. The fact that fire insurance companies reduce the rates where the hazard is comparatively light has been a big factor. Then the general education campaign as conducted by the fire marshal's office and the preventative measures have entered into it.

This country has a long way to go before it reduces its fire hazard to that of the old countries, according to J. A. Tracy, of the state fire marshal's office. In the majority of the European countries the fire hazard averages 30 cents per capita. The average for 237 cities of the United States is \$2.39 per capita. Thirteen large cities, however, show a fire loss of 19 cents per capita. Eleven cities in England 44 cents per capita; in Ireland the loss is 45 cents, in Norway 25 cents per capita.

Liability for Negligence. The Iowa officials are very much interested in a ruling by a Pennsylvania court recently to the effect that the party thru whose negligence a fire occurs is liable for damages caused to all property suffering therefrom. The local officials believe that this will hold good in this state as it has been the custom of many courts recently to hold the party whose negligence caused a fire responsible for damages to others' property.

Just as the many new inventions of modern times have increased the hazard to life and limb, so have they increased the fire hazard. Electricity, and especially electric wiring, causes many fires. In Iowa last year there were sixty fires, due to defective electric wiring. There were 128 fires from various uses of gasoline. The gasoline engine, the automobile and gasoline stoves all cause numerous fires.

Fire Prevention Day. The state officials have received reports from many Iowa communities, which are planning to observe fire prevention day, Saturday, Oct. 9. The schools will quite generally observe the day on Friday, the 8th. At Fort Dodge the Boy Scouts have become interested in the fire prevention movement. Mr. Tracy was up there a few evenings ago and addressed the young members of this body. Each boy in this organization has been assigned to certain territory and it is his duty to notify property owners in his territory of the prevention day and of its requirements.

Robins Meetings Close. Grinnell Students Closely Follow Lectures by Well Known Chicagoan. Special to Times-Republican. Grinnell, Oct. 2.—The series of meetings concluded yesterday by Raymond Robins, of Chicago, were in the opinion of Grinnell students an education in themselves and very few have missed the opportunity of hearing him. Last night in the men's gymnasium Robins spoke to the men of the college, telling the famous story of his mining experiences in Alaska and his conversion to Christianity in that place. Another feature of his series was an address to the classes in economics and political science in the chapel yesterday morning dealing with modern political problems in American cities.

During his stay here Robins and his associates have been having personal talks with the men discussing the life work question and endeavoring to draw from each man what he has in view for his future.

The order sets forth that troops taking part in the tournament will be under strict military discipline and that the service will be without cost to the state.

Fort Dodge. Kate Potts, owner of the Ward hotel on Fourth street and Third avenue south, who last September was sentenced to five years at hard labor in the penitentiary at Fort Madison, now free on bonds awaiting the action of the supreme court on her appeal, was again indicted by the grand jury for maintaining a house of ill fame. From papers filed in his possession, police were inclined to believe that his name was Charley Morris. This he denied, claiming his name was Lee. He was arraigned in Justice Knapp's court and waived preliminary hearing.

DELEGATES SELECTED FOR NATIONAL MEETING

Portrait of Frances Willard Presented to State University—Cash Prizes and Medals Awarded For Essays—Resolutions Condemn Immorality in Public Entertainments.

Special to Times-Republican. Iowa City, Oct. 2.—In the closing session of the Iowa W. C. T. U. Fort Dodge defeated Perry for the 1916 convention. National delegates were selected shortly before adjournment. Mrs. E. E. Lawyer, of Iowa City, being named earlier in the day delegate-at-large for Iowa, and Mrs. W. R. Shields, of Iowa City, alternate, as tributes to the entertaining city.

Gift to University. Dr. T. H. MacBride, president of the university, delivered an address at the final day meeting of the convention, and when Miss Bertha J. Bowers, of Creston, responded, she presented the president for the university, on behalf of the convention, a beautiful picture of Frances Willard to be hung on the university's walls. A gold medal in the state contest of temperance speakers (boys), and Vernal Grant, of Newton, another.

To Miss Lucille Knickerbocher, of Cedar Falls, was awarded \$15 in gold for the best essay on the effects of alcohol on the coming generation, in the eighth grade contest through Iowa, and to Vern Mabon, of Independence, was awarded \$15 in gold for the best high school essay on "Alcohol and Crime." Miss Knickerbocher was present and read her essay.

Resolutions Adopted. The resolutions declared that the past year had helped to make world-wide prohibition more than an idle dream, national prohibition a reality, and state-wide prohibition a reality in twenty states. Legislative victories in Iowa included suffrage and constitutional prohibition amendments, woman's reformatory legislation and the repeal of the unjust laws against immorality in public entertainments—in vaudeville, dances, halls, moving pictures, and in the "speaking drama." Prize fights were also excoriated, as the sentiment in Iowa seems to be growing in favor of that sport.

The resolutions also recommended the "appointment of an international commission drawn from the neutral nations of Europe as well as the United States, which shall explore the issues involved in the present struggle and that shall bring about such negotiations as will make for a constructive and lasting peace."
