NO CORN IN SPOTS

WIDE VARIANCE IN CROP CONDITIONS IN FRANKLIN COUNTY NEIGHBORHOODS.

AUGUST FROST CAUSE OF PECULIAR CONDITIONS

Cobs Only Partially Filled in Fields Where Freeze Struck—Foliage Takes on New Growth But Fails to Benefit Grain—C. E. Wilson's Rural Observations.

Hampton, Oct. 5.—The owner of a big cornfield a short distance from this town said last week, "With two weeks of favorable weather my corn will be ready for freezing weather and will make somewhere from fifty to seventy bushels to the acre."

I asked one well-posted farmer what effect this partial crop failure is having on land prices and he answered, "Higher than ever." Told how he had been approached by a dealer who offered him an unimproved eighty acre tract for \$500 worth of tiling...

One of the men quoted above talked about the time when land prices would come to go higher in this country, temporarily, he said. He told about a farm of a little more than 200 acres, mortgaged at the present time for \$40,000, and owned by a man who has nothing except a farming outfit besides his equity in the farm.

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TO MEET NEW NEEDS

FULL PROFESSORSHIP IN CHEMISTRY TO BE ESTABLISHED AT IOWA STATE COLLEGE.

SPECIAL EQUIPMENT ALREADY INSTALLED

European War Creates Demand For Chemical Engineering at Home, to Supply Materials Formerly Imported—May Be Means of Building Up New Industries in State

Ames, Oct. 5.—The state board of education has decided to establish at Ames a full professorship in chemical engineering. To provide for the new course, for which the new \$300,000 chemistry hall is admirably able to offer the facilities, the Iowa State College administration has caused special equipment to be installed in the chemistry building and more special equipment has been ordered.

The new course in chemical engineering was not a new wrinkle hatched from guesswork at the theorist's desk. The demand for the course came from the people of the state themselves. And the effect is intended to be that Iowa will soon be making her own chemical products, thousands and thousands of dollars worth, which she usually, instead of paying the freight on them from Europe.

This fall a big Iowa business man, an industrial man, came to Ames with a son he wanted to have trained in commercial and manufacturing chemistry. This man, with a head for opportunities, found that there was no such course as he was after given here.

War Makes Demand. This father was not the only one who was thinking about the proposition presented by the war in Europe. There were others in Iowa who had in mind the same ideas on importing

The universities, colleges, high schools, commercial laboratories, including food factories and plants where paints and varnishes and many other things are made, are demanding domestic production of the chemical products which have been coming over from Europe because this country was too busy or too thoughtless to make and market them, and the state board of education has decided to establish at Ames a full professorship in chemical engineering.

The demand may prove to be the means of installing in Iowa a part of the chemical industries the state needs to supply its own needs—an impulse for the "Made in Iowa" movement which the state's economists and business men have been trying to extend the last few years.

STUDENTS FROM MANY STATES.

Sixteen Commonwealths and Two Foreign Countries Represented. Special to Times-Republican.

Grinnell, Oct. 5.—The new college directory for 1915-16, which is about to go to the press, shows that sixteen states and two foreign countries are represented in the total enrollment of Grinnell. Of the sixteen states Iowa, of course, furnishes by far the greater number. Nebraska is second with twenty-one students enrolled, and Minnesota is third with eight. Wisconsin, Illinois, South Dakota, Missouri and Montana are also well represented. One student comes from China and one from Norway.

Iowa City, Oct. 5.—Miss Mae Freeman, of Iowa City, is believed to be Iowa's only woman auditor, as she was appointed to the position left vacant by the recent death of her brother, Walter J. Freeman, when the board of supervisors met Monday afternoon. Several local politicians were candidates. The question of the eligibility of a woman was raised but the board secured legal advice and decided the appointment would be legal.
