KENTUCKY SHERIFF WANTS NADE LONG

OFFICER OF KNOX COUNTY WIRES WILL SEND REQUISITION FOR BARBER.

HIS EFFORTS BALKED BY COURT UNTIL OCT. 16

Effort of Local Officer to Give Townsman Liberal Treatment Stirs Kentucky Sheriff to Send Caustic Telegram—No Further Effort Made to Extradite Long.

A single telegram from Knox county, Kentucky, where Nade Long, a barber of this city, is wanted to answer an indictment charging forgery that was received late Tuesday, is the latest development in the efforts of Knox county to take Long back to the Taylor faction of the mountain country of the Blue Grass state. Long, a supporter of Governor Goebel, who was assassinated before he took office, and the opponent of Taylor, candidate for governor from Knox county, fears extradition. It would take him back to the haunts and into the power of his old-time enemies, he claims.

Late Tuesday a telegram came to Chief of Police Breckel from Barbourville, the county seat of Knox county. It was from Sheriff S. W. Lewis. The telegram read: "Nade Long can't execute bond if apprehended. Will send requisition. Answer."

Long had already executed a bond and had his liberty under its protection. Also the district court had ordered the sheriff to produce Long before Oct. 16, so Long can not be removed from the county.

But all this had already been done before the telegram arrived. At first, when notified by Chief Breckel that he had a warrant for Long's arrest and return to Kentucky, Long was willing to go without an officer coming for him. When he learned that it was in Knox county, the home of Taylor, he changed his mind. That was the country of his enemies of fifteen years ago.

Arrested; Gives Bond. Long consulted an attorney, then changed his mind. To give a fellow townsman a fair chance under the circumstances, Breckel did not arrest Long for forgery. Instead he fled a charge in the mayor's court that Long was a fugitive from justice. The mayor accepted a bond posted by Long and released him. In the meantime habeas corpus proceedings were begun by F. E. Northup, Long's attorney.

The telegram from Sheriff Lewis of Knox county, indicates that he wants Long. It also intimates that if the local police had locked Long in jail he could not have had a chance to have given bond. The sheriff's telegram was notified of it. He is awaiting the next move, which may be to send a requisition and Kentucky officer after Long. If that develops the Kentucky officer will be powerless until Oct. 16 in the face of the local court's order.
