**CITY TO STRAIGHTEN CHANNEL NEAR PARK**

**WILL CUT WATERWAY THRU POINT TO PROTECT PARK PROPERTY.**

**RIVER EATING AWAY BANK ON SOUTH SIDE**

City Will Open Channel Thru Sandy Point Across From Park on North Side of River—Island Will Be Left in River—Hope Thus to Straighten Channel and Protect Land.

To straighten the channel of the Iowa river, and to protect the river bank of the Riverview park from being eaten away by the current, the city is preparing to straighten the channel of the river along the park. The plan is to open a channel thru the point of sand on the north bank of the river north of the park and east of the Third avenue bridge.

The new channel will be cut about due east from the north end of the bridge thru the sand point. Part of the point will be thus separated from the bank and will be left as a small island in the river. It is expected that part of the current will cut into the new channel and may eventually quit the old channel to the south of the island that will be formed so that what is to be an island may later be joined to the park by the action of the river.
