URGE MILK DRINKING

DAIRY BREEDERS ASSOCIATIONS TO CONDUCT CAMPAIGN OF EDUCATION.

TO EXPEND \$200,000 TO EDUCATE PUBLIC

Plan Similar to One Adopted by Raisin Growers of California—Campaign to be Carried on in Principal States of Union—Population Figures Analyzed—State House News.

Special to Times-Republican. Des Moines, Nov. 5.—More than \$200,000 is to be spent by dairy breeders' associations in a publicity campaign to educate the public to drink more milk.

The plan will be somewhat similar to that carried out by the raisin growers of California. They conducted a publicity campaign on the value of raisins as a food and thereby increased the sale of raisins very materially.
