WHY GO UP TOWN? WE HAVE IT

LEGRAND SCHOOL DISTRICTS UNITED

SIXTEEN SECTIONS JOIN IN CONSOLIDATION THAT CARRIES AT ELECTION.

INCLUDES TERRITORY IN MARSHALL AND TAMA

Consolidation Takes in All of Two Independent Districts and Parts of Three Others—May Buy Palmer College Building or Enlarge LeGrand School.

LeGrand and its surrounding territory, which once before tried to organize a consolidated school district but failed to carry the proposal at the election, have now consolidated. By a vote of 125 to 25 the voters of sixteen sections of territory in this and Tama county voted to form one school district.

The country districts carried the proposal by a vote of 83 to 26. In the town of LeGrand it was carried by a vote of 11 to 2. The territory taken in is all of districts Nos. 1 and 5, the former being the LeGrand district; a small part of the Quarry district; No. 4 district, the latter being the Dillon school district; and four sections in Tama county.

Building Plans Uncertain. It is not yet known what will be done to secure a building large enough for the new school. Opinion in LeGrand is divided, but determination will be up to the next school board of the district, which is to be elected in two or three weeks.

Some favor purchasing the old Palmer College property, if it can be bought for a reasonable sum, and remodeling it to suit the needs of the school. Either the college or academy building would be amply large. Others think that the LeGrand three-room school building could be made adequate by adding to it three more rooms.

The district has taken in enough territory to obtain state aid providing it teaches agricultural and domestic science as prescribed by the state.

Concrete Roads Grow Sixty Fold.

The mileage of concrete pavements in the United States has increased rapidly, and it is likely to continue to increase, according to a new bulletin of the United States department of agriculture. This bulletin gives the estimated amount of concrete pavement in the United States in 1914 as 13,200,000 square yards; in 1909 it was only 264,000 square yards.

The principal advantage of concrete pavements which have led to this increase in popularity are said to be: 1. Durability under ordinary traffic conditions.

2. A smooth, even surface offering little resistance.

3. Absence of dust and ease with which it may be cleaned.

4. Comparatively small cost of maintenance until renewals are necessary.

5. Availability as a base for another type of surface if desirable.

6. Attractive appearance.

Few Great Men Left.
