PREPARE TO BUILD LINE WEST OF CITY

IOWA RAILWAY AND LIGHT COMPANY TO EXTEND SERVICE TO COLO AND AMES.

APPLIES TO COMMISSION FOR THE RIGHT-OF-WAY

Wants State Grant to Acquire Right-of-Way For Poles From This City to Colo and From Nevada to Ames—Nevada and Ames May Be Supplied From Boone Plant.

The first move that will result in the building of a high tension electric line by the Iowa Railway and Light Company from this city west has been made by the filing of an application with the state railroad commission for a right-of-way. The application asks for a franchise for a right-of-way from this city to Colo, and from Nevada to Ames.

The commission has fixed the hearing for 10 o'clock Nov. 16 at its office in the capitol building at Des Moines. At that time it will hear objections to the granting of the franchise for the route selected.

Will Follow Northwestern. The route chosen by the Iowa Railway and Light Company follows as closely as possible the north side of the Northwestern, excepting where it is necessary to follow the highways nearby. From the west limit of the city to just east of Lamolle the right-of-way asked for is a strip of land twenty-five feet wide abutting the north line of the Northwestern right-of-way. The proposed route is thru Lamolle, but west of the town the right-of-way wanted again follows the Northwestern line. It will pass thru State Center on the Lincoln Highway, which goes thru the northern edge of the town.

West of State Center the right-of-way again drops back to alongside the Northwestern right-of-way and follows it to Colo.

Nevada to Ames. According to the application no right-of-way is asked for from Colo to Nevada. The local office of the company has no information on the subject, but it is presumed here the supply line from this city will extend no farther than Colo. Nevada and west will be supplied, it is thought, from the Boone plant of the company.

This may account for the break in the line between Colo and Nevada. Application is made for a right-of-way from Nevada to Ames that adjoins the Northwestern right-of-way.

Probably Build in Spring. Altho it is not known here, it is presumed that the company does not expect to undertake this building project until next spring, as it will require a few months to get the material on the ground. To this line will be attached the feeder that will supply the towns of Rhodes and Baxter, where the company has already secured franchises. The feeder will tap the high tension line near State Center.
