RAISE \$1,640 FOR CHARITY IN CITY

CANVASS OF ASSOCIATED CHARITIES BRINGS GOOD-SIZED SUM FOR NEEDY POOR.

CHURCHES WILL BE ASKED FOR CLOTHING

Nearly One-Half of the Sum Subscribed, or \$733, Given in Cash—Charities Have Money to Go Ahead With the Work—Clothing For Children Needed.

Sixteen hundred forty dollars has been pledged to the Associated Charities for its work among the poor of the city up to the time the canvass was ended today. The work of gathering the pledges was resumed Wednesday after having been postponed from last week.

Of the sum subscribed \$733 has been paid in cash, so that the Associated Charities has money with which to begin its work at once. As yet the churches have not been asked to help in this movement. Next Sunday the plans of the Associated Charities will be presented in each of the churches as far as possible, and they will be asked to contribute clothing at their Christmas exercises.

Two stoves wanted by Mrs. Luther Ray, the agent of the association, were secured at once by means of the publicity given by the Times-Republican. Clothing needed was also furnished Mrs. Ray. She is now very badly in need of children's clothing of all kinds. This need is pressing, urgent and should be supplied immediately. Mrs. Ray says she has calls for clothing for infants and for children of all ages up to 7 or 8 years of age especially. If she is notified at telephone No. 1187 she will send for the garments.

MRS. GOWLAND DEAD.

Old Resident of City Succumbs to Short Illness of Pneumonia. After an illness of seven days, due to pneumonia, Mrs. Susan Gowland, widow of Frank Gowland, and a resident of the city since 1847, died at 3 o'clock this morning at her home, 211 South Center street.

Mrs. Gowland was born Susan Pooley in England, Sept. 12, 1844, one of a family of twenty children. She came to this country with her parents in 1855, the family settling in Will county, Illinois, and later moving to Chicago, where, for several years, Miss Pooley was employed in the dry goods store of F. & L. Leiter, which later became the firm of Marshall Field & Co. Miss Pooley became the wife of

Francis Gowland in the spring of 1866, and the following spring went to housekeeping in the house at 211 South Center, which Mr. Gowland had built, and which has since been the family home.

Mrs. Gowland is survived by one son, Rev. Frank Gowland, pastor of the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene at Webster City. One other son, John, who learned the printer's trade and for years was employed in the Times-Republican composing rooms, died May 30, 1898. Mr. Gowland died Jan. 9, 1899.
