

IOWA MAN MURDERED

FORMER RESIDENT OF LAMONT AND FONTANELLE KILLED AT DULUTH, MINN.

MUTILATED BODY FOUND ON RAILROAD TRACKS

Evidently Had Been Pushed Over Bluff—Robbery Believed to Have Been Motive—Recently Invested in Minnesota Farm Lands—Body to Be Taken to Fontanelle.

Lamont, Dec. 11.—The chancellor commander of the Knights of Pythias here yesterday received a telegram from an undertaker at Duluth, Minn., stating the body of W. D. Jones, formerly of Lamont, had been found on a railroad track.

Identification was made by lodge receipts and a bank book. Mystery surrounds the death, although it is supposed Jones was murdered for the money he had on his person.

The body had apparently been pushed off a twenty-foot wall on to the railroad tracks. Surmounting the wall was a fence six feet high. The supposition is that robbers went thru Jones' pockets, took his money and then threw him over the fence, down the twenty-foot declivity.

Had Bought Farm. Jones was unmarried and has no relatives here. It is understood that his folks live at Fontanelle, Iowa. He left here two months ago for Minnesota, where he bought a farm of 160 acres at Elyria, Minn.

He was killed instantly, his three companions being unhurt. The car was turned over and one rear wheel demolished. The party was enroute from Elyria to Ottumwa after a car had been used by three of the party earlier in the night. A mishap put it out of commission and they were going to tow it back to Elyria when the accident occurred. Miller leaves a wife and two children besides his parents, all of whom reside at Elyria.
