SALOON CASES GO UP

DAVENPORT LIQUOR DEALERS WILL APPEAL AT ONCE TO SUPREME COURT.

MAKE NO RESISTANCE TO TEMPORARY INJUNCTION

No Attempt to Be Made to Keep Places Open Pending Ruling by High Court—Four Hundred Brewery and Saloon Workers of Davenport Petition State to Find Employment For Them.

Davenport, Jan. 4.—That the attorneys for the saloonkeepers who are testing the validity of the Iowa dry laws will not contest the granting of a temporary injunction against them in the Scott county district court next Friday, is the idea prevailing here today.

The hearing on the temporary injunction against the three Davenport saloonkeepers who opened their bars this morning for the purpose of starting a test case will be held before Judge M. E. Douglas, in the Scott county district court Friday, Jan. 7.
