

G. A. R. COMMITTEE MEETS HERE JAN. 13

DEFINITE DATES FOR ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT IN JUNE TO BE DECIDED ON.

ASSISTANT ADJT.-GENERAL G. A. NEWMAN TO PRESIDE

Heads of W. R. C. and Ladies of G. A. R., as well as Members of Council of Administration, to Be Present—Hotel and Lodging Accommodations Will Be Inspected.

To set the definite date of the annual encampment, which is to be held here in June, and to discuss various plans for the accommodation of the delegates, the council of administration of the G. A. R. of Iowa, as well as several officers of that organization and the W. R. C., will meet at the Marshalltown Club Thursday, Jan. 13.

Secretary Johnson, of the club, received word this morning that G. A. Newman, of Des Moines, assistant adjutant general, will be present at the conference, as well as the president of W. R. C. and an officer of the Ladies of G. A. R. It is probable that all of the members of the council of the administration will not be present, as they have not notified Mr. Newman as yet.

Besides setting the actual dates for the convention, the meeting here will have for its purpose the inspecting of hotel accommodations, the securing of halls, estimation of seating capacity needed, and arrangements for lodgings for the delegates.

MINNESOTA LAND OPENING.

Part of Red Lake Indian Reservation For Settlers.

Warren, Minn., Jan. 10.—Eight thousand acres of Minnesota land, a part of the Red Lake Indian reservation, known as Mud Lake bottom, will be thrown open to entry and settlement early next spring, according to an announcement by local agents today, based on information received from the general land office in Washington.

Twice before the interior department has made arrangements to open this land, which is located in the eastern part of Marshall county, but certain complications arose and delays ensued. Mud Lake bottom was not an agricultural section, but a body of water known in Minnesota as good fishing and hunting territory until draining operations carried out in water. Lands along the banks had been patented to various "riparian owners."

After the draining, squatters appeared on the choice portions and as a result disputes arose between the riparian owners and the intruders as to legal title. Litigation along this line is expected after the spring opening.

The money obtained by the government from the opening will go to the Indian fund, it was stated.

Sausages—Cut link sausages apart and pierce each two or three times with a silver fork. Cover with boiling water and cook for ten minutes. Drain and fry quickly until brown.

Frozen baked apples—Pare, core and quarter eight tart apples. Bake with sugar and lemon juice until tender. Scald half a cupful each of milk and cream and cool. Pour over the apples and freeze.

Potroast of beef—Cut two pounds of beef from the round into small pieces. Slice one onion and two small carrots. Add a sprig of parsley, salt and pepper. Pour over it a cupful and a half of liquid, half canned tomato and half liquid. Bake slowly for two hours, adding more liquid if necessary.

Many Churchmen to Attend Funeral of Prelate at Omaha.

Omaha, Jan. 10.—Distinguished archbishops, bishops and priests of the Catholic churches in various cities of the middle west will come to Omaha to participate in the funeral services for Right Reverend Richard Scannell, bishop of the diocese of Omaha, whose death from pneumonia at the age of almost 71 years, occurred early Saturday morning.

The funeral services will be held Wednesday morning at St. John's church, Twenty-fifth and California streets, and will begin at 9:30 o'clock. Burial will be in Holy Sepulcher cemetery. For a considerable time before the funeral and burial, the body of the distinguished prelate will lie in state.


