

IMPROVE ROAD SYSTEM

Clinton County Begins Reconstruction of All Highways From Flatlands to Bluffs—Will Require Three to Five Years to Complete.

Clinton, Feb. 16.—One of the greatest engineering projects ever undertaken by a corps of county engineers in Iowa, involving the complete reconstruction of all the roads leading from the Mississippi flat lands to the higher bluffs in the central and western part of Clinton county, is now being opened up by County Engineer Lorenzen and his staff of assistants here.

The project will require from three to five years for its completion and will carry gangs of workmen all along the line of bluffs which flank the flood plains of the Mississippi in the eastern part of Clinton county. The reasons for the changes have been clearly set out by the county engineer after a careful study of the situation. In the original construction of the county highways, they were made to conform directly to township line marks, regardless of the topography over which they ran. In this way, the east and west roads, which lead from the flat lands are forced to run up directly over some of the most difficult hills in the county.

By altering the courses of these roads, to make them pass around instead of over the hill, it will be possible to establish an even gradient, and eliminate some of the worst of the climbs. This is the plan now being considered and charts of the necessary changes will be made out during the coming season. The project is one of the broadest which has yet come within the scope of the county engineer's authority and will be an undertaking which will require the expenditure of large sums before its completion.

CUMMINS CLUB IN WEST.

Former Iowans in California Organize to Promote Candidacy.

The Los Angeles Times of Feb. 11 says:

"Mr. Crall was on Senator Cummins' military staff, and Mr. Beeson was one of his secretaries, when the senator was governor of Iowa."

Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the famous suffragist, has established headquarters in New York to raise funds in aid of the Serbian war sufferers and also of the English "war babies," children of Englishmen killed in the war. Mrs. Pankhurst received from London several small photographs of her family of four "war babies," the Misses Jan, Elizabeth and Mary, aged six months, and Kathleen, one year old. "The fathers of two were officers killed at the Dardanelles," said Mrs. Pankhurst. The picture shows one of the little victims of the war with its nurse.

New Sterilizing Agent.

German scientists have found that glycerol is a valuable sterilizing agent. Various deadly germs, when heated in it to a temperature of 248 degrees Fahrenheit, were completely killed in one minute. This process is particularly valuable for sterilizing surgical instruments, for the reason that the metal is not attacked and not is the former affected. Rubber tubes can be sterilized in it, and instead of being injured, the elasticity of those which have become brittle is restored by the treatment.
