Stuffed oysters—Place oysters on the half shell and on top of each place a slice of bacon. Spread the bacon with a paste made from one cup of bread crumbs, one tablespoon of melted butter, one each of chopped parsley and chopped mushrooms. Season with salt and paprika and bake in the oven until the oysters curl.

Stuffed baked potatoes—Scoop out the inside of baked potatoes; cut them in cubes and add teaspoonful of chopped green pepper to each potato, with the same of rich cream sauce. Fill the potato and bake.

Orange whip—Whip one pint of cream stiff with one-half cup of powdered sugar and the white of an egg. Add the grated rind and juice of an orange. Serve very cold.

Mayor Laub Endorsed.

Special to Times-Republican. Des Moines, March 13.—Over 400 voters came out to the citizens caucus to nominate city officials. There had been a rumor that the old mayor and council were to be ousted and they and their friends were on hand to defend. The formal ballot stood: For mayor, W. H. Laub, the incumbent, 222; J. T. Carey, former mayor, 141; The Pierson, drayman, 62. As 215 was needed to nominate, Mr. Laub was named. Other nominations: C. L. Voss, treasurer; H. A. Norman, assessor; J.

H. Tamm and J. H. Hayes, councilmen at large, and Thomas Nielson, H. N. Moeller and Benjamin Pritch, ward councilmen. They were all renominations except that Mr. Patch takes the place of Dr. Simpson. The voters felt that the council which had contracted for the paving should see that it was laid.

CONTEST AT OSAGE.
