**FARMERS AND GROWERS**

Many Growers Have Contracted—Sweet Corn Acreage Not Yet Filled—Regular Growers Have Increased Their Planting.

The success met in contracting for canning crops predicts a large increase in acreage this year. There is still a large amount of sweet corn to be filled. Approximately 50 per cent of our entire requirements are still open. Many growers are contracting twenty to thirty acres of sweet corn each.

It is suggested to those who have never grown this crop for canning, that they permit us to show them how profitable it may be. This crop is fast gaining in favor and many farmers are getting into it in order that they may have the feed it produces. This feed is almost as good as clover hay. It makes a fine crop with which to fill silos. The large amount of sugar and starch, together with the small amount of crude fiber, contained, almost replaces the corn which is in regular field corn silage. This has been shown by chemical analysis of each.
