

TAXES OF \$313,883 PAID DURING MARCH

TAXES PAID IN MARCH AND IN FIRST QUARTER LARGER THAN LAST YEAR.

INCREASE IN LAST MONTH \$29,424.29

Collections During First Three Months of This Year Were \$34,040 More Than in Same Quarter of 1915—\$41,024 Paid on Last Day of March to Escape Tax Penalty.

Taxes collected in the office of County Treasurer S. M. Gause in the month of March totaled \$313,883.35, and taxes paid in the office in the three months ending March 31 were \$364,421.14.

The increase in March over March, 1915, was \$29,424.29. The total for March of last year was \$384,459.04. The collections for the first quarter of the year show an increase of \$34,040.59 over the same period of 1915, when the amount collected was \$330,380.63.

The huge sum of \$124,270.16 was paid in taxes in the treasurer's office in the last four days of March, and on March 31 there was paid \$41,024.43. The spring distribution of tax money will probably not be made until about April 15.

VIADUCT STEPS FINISHED.

Arrival of Flooring Only Thing That is Delayed Completion of Bridge.

With the completion of the four pairs of stairs leading up to the viaduct, and most of the sidewalk along both sides of the overhead bridge, the arrival of the flooring is the only thing which is keeping the men from finishing their work in short order.

The steps were finished Monday, but are not in use, as the walkway on the viaduct is not yet completed, and it would be dangerous to allow foot passengers on the bridge before the flooring had been laid over the iron framework.

People who climb the stairs at Market street will have to negotiate thirty-three steps, while the walkway on the viaduct in front of the Northwestern station will have to clamber up forty-one steps before they reach the top.

"DOC" ANDREWS' UMPIRE.

Former Central Association Manager to Handle Indicator in Western.

Dr. J. A. Andrews, the eccentric pilot of the Waterloo Jays in 1913-14-15, has stepped from the ranks of player-managers to one of the duties of an umpire in the Western league.

The doctor has just received an appointment by President Zehring, head of the Western, as one of the official arbitrators of that circuit.

"Doc" returns to duty in an organization he helped to found, having succeeded the berth of the Western in 1900. He played with or managed several of the clubs which have held membership in the organization in the earlier days of his diamond career.

Also there were upwards of seventy-five applicants for the position. Andrews was one of the first chosen. The list of applicants included many experienced men from the major league to Class D circuits.

SLATTERY MAKING GOOD.

Holds Pirate Vannigan to One Hit in Four Innings of Practice Game.

"Phil" Slattery, star twirler of the Ansons in 1915, is making good with the Pittsburgh Pirates. Pitching for the Pirates regular, in a game with the recruits to one hit in four innings. He was relieved by Moran, a left hander sought by "Bobby" Lynch for the Ansons last season, and Moran permitted but three safe blows in the closing five innings.

The regulars held the yanigans scoreless. Slattery's throwing on the spring training trip has been very good, and it is expected that he will be retained by Callahan.

Meanwhile Richardson, of the 1914 and 1915 Ansons, is not faring quite so well. The big right hander was sent against the Chattanooga club Thursday, pitching for the Philadelphia recruits.

Richardson and Melinger, the latter a former Cedar Rapids moundman, divided the labor and were defeated by Chattanooga by a score of 7 to 4. The southerners registered nine of the two former Central association stars.

Har, this spring. The assessors expect to have all the assessment rolls in the hands of the council by Saturday night, and it will require probably a week or two longer for the board to review them.

It is in the case this work will be finished at an earlier date than for a number of years. Saturday township boards all over the county met as boards of review. In Timber Creek, Linn, Taylor and Marietta townships the work has been finished and the assessors' books have been turned into the county auditor's office.
