

CAMPAIGN IS ON; PUBLIC WAKES UP

NATION JUST BEGINNING TO REALIZE THIS IS PRESIDENTIAL YEAR.

REMARKABLE APATHY NOW DISAPPEARING

War in Europe instrumental in keeping politics in background—Campaign of Cummins beginning to be recognized in East—Hughes refuses to eliminate himself.

[Special Correspondence.] Washington, April 11.—For the first time there has begun to appear evidence that the public is waking up to the fact that 1916 is a campaign year and that a real old-fashioned political struggle involving the presidency and the control of the government is at hand.

Until recently, there have been signs of a remarkable apathy and indifference to politics. This has not been true of the men whose business it is to keep in politics and in touch with the man in the street and in the pursuit of his usual affairs. One reason why the country has been slow in manifesting interest in politics is apparently the upheaval in Europe. The war and complications growing out of it have tended to thrust politics into the background.

However, the political conventions are drawing nigh and the country is waking up. This has not been true of the men whose business it is to keep in politics and in touch with the man in the street and in the pursuit of his usual affairs. One reason why the country has been slow in manifesting interest in politics is apparently the upheaval in Europe. The war and complications growing out of it have tended to thrust politics into the background.

Cummins Campaign Growing. Senator Cummins as a presidential candidate has been attracting more and more attention in the east. It is coming to be understood that he will enter the convention with much western strength and that he can not be overlooked as a factor in the convention. Some of the eastern politicians, moreover, have come to realize that Senator Cummins is not in mood to be switched to this candidate or that lieutenants of Roosevelt and lieutenants of Hughes and other candidates have tried to disseminate this impression for obvious reasons.

Justice Hughes is sitting tight on the supreme bench. He probably will continue to sit tight. The various attempts to make him come out in the open, that is, to "smoke him out," have failed. Justice Hughes evidently does not desire to eliminate himself and, therefore, it would be a simple thing for him to say the word that would mean elimination. "I will not accept the nomination under any circumstances," will be sufficient to eliminate Justice Hughes, but there is no reason to suppose he is framing such a proclamation.

Powerful Roosevelt Backing. The Roosevelt candidacy unquestionably is being promoted by powerful political forces. This has been evident for some time and especially since his return from the West Indies. Whether he will get the nomination is constantly discussed in political quarters here. It is certain a tremendous attempt is going to be made at Chicago to "put the Colonel over." The Roosevelt candidacy is not taken seriously by the best-informed men here. They regard it as really a pro-Roosevelt move and in opposition to Hughes.

BOELKE, AVIATOR, GERMAN POPULAR HERO



In German eyes, Lieutenant Boelke and his friendly rival, Lieutenant Immemann, of the German army aviation corps are heroes almost if not quite as great as Von Hindenburg, Von Weddigen and a few other popular leaders the war has produced. Emperor William has sent a letter of thanks in his own handwriting to Lieutenant Boelke for his achievements in aerial warfare. The official German report of March 22 said that Lieutenant Boelke, in an aerial engagement near Verdun, had brought down his thirteenth aeroplanes.



Nitrogen. One of nature's methods of fixing nitrogen is familiar to everyone, but does not seem to have suggested itself to chemists as one to be imitated. When water trickles through the earth in which there is much organic matter and oozes out through the mortar of a wall, the wall becomes incrustated with pure niter, or saltpeter. What has happened is this: The water has dissolved much of the potassium in the soil and picked up millions of the nitrifying bacteria in the earth and carried them through the mortar, in which there is much lime. The potassium deposited on the wall is exposed to the air and the nitrifying bacteria begin to draw from this the nitrogen which combines with the potassium to make niter.
