**COUNCIL PREPARES TO PAVE MAIN ROADS**

ORDERS RESOLUTIONS FOR ALL SIX HIGHWAYS AS FAR AS CITY LIMITS.

SOUTH TWELFTH, BOONE TO DOTY, INCLUDED

Council Includes Other Four Roads of Project Proposed — Business Men's Committee Pledges Assistance—Add North Ninth and Twelfth Streets to List of Streets to be Paved.

The city council will pave all six main roads to the city limits this season instead of only the Lincoln Highway. Urged to action to complete the whole plan, instead of only two of the roads, by the committee which proposed the project and promoted it, the council this forenoon took preliminary action on the other four main roads that were not included in the resolution on which objections will be heard April 24.

It instructed City Engineer W. H. Steiner and City Solicitor F. E. North to prepare and submit the necessary resolutions for paving with pavement sixteen feet wide North and South Center streets, North Third and Summit street to the limits of the city.

Include South Twelfth. The council also instructed the city solicitor to prepare and submit the necessary resolutions for paving with pavement twenty-four feet wide from Boone to Doty streets, with the exception of a short distance both north and south of the M. & St. L. railroad crossing from the brow of each little hill to the tracks. The resolution states it is the intention to pave this section with orders temporarily and until a viaduct over the railroad track is built for a permanent crossing. The South Twelfth street part of the project was omitted from the Lincoln Highway pavement when it was ordered improved.

Committee Pledges Assistance. A resolution of the committee which prepared these projects was filed with the council. The resolution requested the council to pave all six of the streets, instead of two as the council at first proposed. The committee pledges its aid and assistance to the council to help it to put thru the projects successfully. The resolution was signed by Judge B. F. Cummings, George A. Turner, T. Binford, A. A. Moore, D. W. Norris, and Merritt Greene. Some of the committee members will be heavily assessed for pavement on some of these roads.

Adds More Street Paving. After the council had prepared the list of streets to be ordered paved two weeks ago, property owners living along North Ninth street presented a petition asking that the street be paved not only to State, as the council had ordered it, but north to Summit street. The council added the two blocks this forenoon and also the block of North Twelfth street from Main to State street.

**L. L. PITCHER DEAD.**

Former Grocer of City Dies After Long Illness of Cancer.

Lyman L. Pitcher, a former retail grocer of this city, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. R. Rouse, 412 North Second street, Sunday morning at 4:30 of cancer of the prostate gland and bladder. He had been ill since October.

Lyman Lorenzo Pitcher was a native of Polo, Ill., where he was born June 8, 1842. He was united in marriage with Miss Sarah Aurora Austin at Leona, Ill., June 25, 1864, and lived for several years at Leona, where he was in the produce and agricultural implement business. Mr. and Mrs. Pitcher came to this city twenty-one years ago last fall and Mr. Pitcher went into the grocery business on North Fourth avenue. Mrs. Pitcher died Jan. 15, 1908.

Surviving Mr. Pitcher are five children—Mrs. Rouse and George and Henry Pitcher, of this city, and Walter and Austin Pitcher, of Collins. One sister, Mrs. Dan Austin, of Lincoln, Neb., and a brother, F. H. Pitcher, of Delta, Colo., also survive.

Funeral services will be held from the Rouse home Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 in charge of Rev. L. N. Rich. Burial will be in Riverside.
