

SODA TANK EXPLODES

Two Men Seriously Injured in Restaurant at Fremont—Both Hurt by Ceiling—Both Probably Crippled for Life by Broken Bones.

Fremont, April 18.—The explosion of the gas tank in the soda fountain at the Meyers restaurant here Sunday afternoon about 5 o'clock, resulted in Ralph Meyers and Raymond Chasey being seriously injured. Chasey loses one leg and Meyers may lose one foot.

The accident occurred as the two young men were charging the tank. The explosion resulted in amputation of Chasey's left leg due to the braces inflicted by the pieces of flying metal that struck the injured member like that much shrapnel.

BACK PAY FOR BLACKSMITH.

Frank Snouffer, of Atlantic, Expects to Receive \$3,000 From Uncle Sam. Atlantic, April 18.—Frank Snouffer of the Snouffer blacksmith shop in this city was very agreeably surprised recently when he received notice from Newton D. Baker, the new secretary of war, that he was entitled to his back pay earned doing blacksmith duty during the civil war and for which he had never been remunerated.

He had marched to the front with his regiment, but had scarcely seen active service when he was detailed as a blacksmith by his officers and spent the remainder of the war shoeing horses for the cavalry and repairing weapons and bayonets. When his regiment went into Washington at the end of the war, he was with them, but took a three days furlough. Returning, he found that his regiment had gone to Lexington, Ky., to receive their discharge. Being without money, he did not join them, and although his discharge papers were lying in the war department offices at Washington all these years, he had not claimed them until recently.

FRIEND OF BEECHERS DEAD.

Iowa Woman Helped Copy "Uncle Tom's Cabin" Manuscript. Special to Times-Republican. Montezuma, April 18.—Two aged ladies have passed away during the past two or three days. Mrs. Kate M. Brown died suddenly after an active day about her home and in her garden. She was 75 years of age. Born in Boston, a number of her earlier years were afterward spent in the Beecher home. She was well acquainted with Harriet Beecher Stowe and it is said Mrs. Brown helped to copy the manuscript of "Uncle Tom's Cabin." The family home had been in and around Montezuma for many years. Mr. Brown died twelve or fifteen years ago, since which time Mrs. Brown and one of her daughters had lived here. After many years of invalidism Mrs. Rebecca Hall died on Sunday night, aged 86. She was the widow of John Hall, a long-time resident here. He was one of the founders of the first bank, which he later assisted in organizing into the First National Bank and was for many years its president. Mrs. Hall has not been able to walk

for the past eight years and her poor health dates long prior to that. She leaves an only son, John Hall, Jr., of Grinnell.

DAY-OLD CHICK INDUSTRY

been and is increasing rapidly. This is due in part to the fact that the large egg and broiler farms have seen the advantage of not running their own incubators, owing to the low cost of buying chicks. Today it sells tens of thousands of chicks in a season. The growth of the business has been wonderful. Dozens of breeders who had not offered chicks for sale were asked time and again to quote prices. And although there probably will be twice as many breeders offering chicks for sale this year, yet the demand will again exceed the supply.

There are many things to consider in the purchase of, or sale of, day-old chicks. For example: The increasing demand for chicks; the saving of time, trouble, and expense by the purchaser, how to figure the value of the chicks; the many risks involved in the purchase of eggs for hatching; the shipping problem, the possibilities of fraud, and lastly, the equipment. Future Possibilities. The demand for day-old chicks, has

may not be fertile, or if fertile the germ of life may be too weak to develop into a chick. Eggs may be old, although this is not so common now as formerly. Eggs may be broken in shipment or shaken up so badly that the germ may be injured. Very often the eggs may be placed so close to a stove or to steam pipes that the germs start. Later if the eggs are taken out into the cold, the eggs may be chilled and the germ killed. As the incubator may not run smoothly, the heat may run up too high, or the eggs may be chilled, if not enough heat be supplied. Then too, the machine needs cleaning after each hatch and many neglect this with a result of poor hatches.

to believe that a chick in the hand is worth two in the shell. Methods of Shipment. The shipping of baby chicks is now considered a serious problem by many who have not had experience, and by those who have received shipments that were not properly handled. The purchaser may be whatever the shipper may prefer, the main points being to secure good ventilation, roominess combined with lightness and strength. An important feature that has not been observed by most shippers is in having a large label, having on it printed instructions to the expressman and to the purchaser. On this label should appear in large letters the warning "Do Not Feed." Very often a tender-hearted expressman, upon hearing the price of the baby chicks, has fed them, supposed the chicks to be crying for food. The purchaser of the chicks is even more likely to feed the chicks on their arrival. He too supposes that the chicks are hungry. This is often the case, but in most cases the chicks arrive at their destination Baby chicks, after being shipped. No feed should be given the chicks until they are thirty-six or forty-eight hours old, as nature has provided them with enough unabsorbed yolk of the egg to carry them over the first few hours of their life.
